—The Home Enterprise Company are replacing the exhaust line from their gas engine to the outside of the building to prevent any further ill effects from the exhaust.

—Mrs. Rachael Summerbelle died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. M. E. Whitford, at Nile, Dec. 29th, aged 90 years. Deceased was the widow of the late Rev. Summerbelle, well known in this locality.

—Barney McEntee, aged 86 years, died Dec. 27th, at Angelica. Mr. McEntee was ill and under the care of a nurse. He was left alone a short time and upon the return of those in charge he was found on the floor and the room afire. Mr. McEntee had evidently attempted to arise from the bed and in doing so had tipped over a lamp which set the room ablaze. Death was caused by the inhaling of smoke. Deceased was a veteran of the Civil War. He was born in Ireland and for a number of years prior to coming to the United States served in the English Army and later in the Canadian Army. By his request he was buried in his soldiers uniform with his body wrapped with the flag for which he fought.
