A. DOLSON  
DIES IN BUFFALO

... Former Attorney. The Close of an Active and Successful Career Was Buried in Bath.

... has received of the Attorney Charles A. Dolson of the best known men of the legal profession in Buffalo, Monday morning an attack of pneumonia which was formerly a resident of this village, where he had his profession for years. He was born in Bath, in 1855, his father was Dr. J. S. Dolson.

... close of his school life he became a member of the profession of law, his admission to the bar was in 1888, and he settled at Andover, N. Y. He established himself as the strongest trial lawyer in the county. He soon formed a partnership with D. P. Richardson, a man who like himself was a leading lawyer in the firm continued for about years having been engaged in the most important cases of the time. In 1875 Mr. Dolson desired a larger field to labor, where he soon to the front and became one of the leading members in that city. Upon leaving he returned to Andover where he devoted a large part of his time to his large stock of his friends, but drifted back into the law, and it was not long that his abilities as a lawyer became so widely known. In 1888, upon the death of Hon. Horace Bemis, one of the leading lawyers of that city and former partner with Hon. George Dolson & Orent, the firm bearing the name of Dolson & Orent, was known to the present day as one of the strongest in the country, having been sought after in the most important cases.

... partnership was dissolved and for a short time he practiced alone. Shortly thereafter, however, his brother S. Dolson associated with him and about fifteen years ago, desiring a larger field to labor, he moved to Buffalo.

... his residence in Buffalo he has been Deputy Attorney General of the State and was a criminal lawyer in Buffalo, although he took a very active interest in Buffalo.
