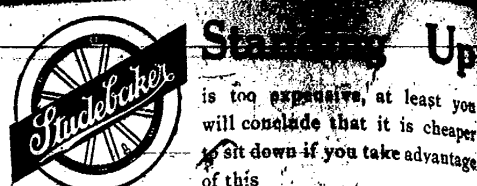

Letter Furnished By V. N. Adams. Written 91 years Ago By a Relative to Grand Back East.  
March 17th day 1825
