SPRAY POTATOES WITH BORAX THIS YEAR. In spite of the present high price for copper sulfate this year, many farmers who grow potatoes will wish to spray them in order to prevent the blight which was so general and destructive last year. The question arises whether it will pay to use Bordeaux mixture. Some are considering the use of a commercial prepared Bordeaux and others the use of sulphur in some form. The New York State College of Agriculture at Cornell University points out that experiments conducted by several experiment stations show that Bordeaux mixture is the most efficient fungicide for controlling potato blight and that there is no satisfactory substitute. Lime-sulfur solution should not be used on potato vines as it injures them. Some of the commercial Bordeaux pastes have given good results.

Experimental work has indicated that it may be possible to use a weaker Bordeaux than has heretofore been generally recommended, and the college advocates the use of such a mixture. A 3-3-50 Bordeaux, or three pounds of copper sulfate, and three pounds of lime, to fifty gallons of water, may be effective if the applications are thorough and timely. Since the disease starts during damp weather, it is necessary to have the vines sprayed before such weather comes on; and it will not be necessary to spray for blight if the weather continues dry. One spraying, however, will not protect the new growth that come out after an application is made, so that new growth should be protected by subsequent applications before blight weather comes on. From four to eight applications, depending on weather conditions, are necessary to control blight and rot.

The vines should be sprayed thoroughly. This can be done best with a pump that will maintain a pressure of 120 pounds or more depending upon the nozzle used. A fine mist should be produced that will be driven among the vines, or will float among them, so as to protect them completely. Detailed information may be had by writing to the department of plant pathology, college of agriculture, Ithaca, New York.
