SPRAY POTATOES WITH BORAX THIS YEAR will wish to spray them in order to prevent the blight which was so general and destructive last year. The question arises whether it will pay to use Boreaux mix-ure. Some are considering the use of a conunercial prepared bordeaux and others the use of sulphur in some form

sulphur in some form.
The New York State College of Agriculture at Cornell University oints out that experimens conducted by several experiment stations show that bordeaux mixture is the most efficient fungicid for controlling potato blight that there is no satisfacory sub-stitute. Lime-suitur solution stitute. Lime-suifur solution should not be used on potato vine as it injures them. Some of the commercial bordeaux pastes have

given good results.

Experimental work has indicated that it may be possible to use a weaker bordeaux than has heretofore been generally recommended and the solutions. nended, and the college advocates the use of such a mixture. A 3-350 bordeaux, or three pounds of
copper sulfate, and three pounds
of lime, to fifty gallons of water.

may be effective if the applica-tions are thorough and timely.

Since the disease starts during damp weather, it is necessary to have the vines sprayed befor such weather comes on; and it will not be necessary to spray fo blight if the weather continues dr One spraying, however, will not protect the new growth that come out after an application is made, so that new growth should be so that new growth should be so that new growth should be protected by subsequent applica-tions before blight weather comes on. 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
