THE Juvenile Courts have saved thousands of boys and girls from lives of crime. Until they were established children were herded into the "bull pens" of criminal court buildings with hardened criminals and thrown into intimate association with men and women with the worst records of crime. In Omaha, Neb., Judge Estelle founded a Child Saving Station, as it might be called, for he established a special court for boy and girl offenders, and the work he has done has been a model for all the nation. He will speak at the Chautauqua on the third day and will tell of the work he has done in this juvenile court. He is a man of ripe experience, and his lecture "The Law, the Lass and the Lad" is full of interest.

DISEASE THREATENS WHITE PINE

The Fungus Was Imported From Europe With Nursery Stock.

A comparatively new disease has gained a foothold in New York and adjoining states. Investigators point out that all persons who have white pine trees, or pine trees closely related to it, should acquaint themselves with the disease and with the methods for controlling it. All the pine trees which bear their needles in bundles of five are susceptible to the disease. They are important throught the United States both as ornamental and timber trees. The United States department of agriculture is co-operating with various institutions in New York State in studying the present distribution of the disease. It is recommended that every one interested should write to the United States department of agriculture at Washington for Farmers' Bulletin 742, which treats of the blister rust.
