10,000 FOR FEDERAL ROADS

The Government is Now on Hand in Helping State Construct Highways Will Pay 50 Percent.

A sum of \$5,000,000 of Federal money is made available for the construction of rural roads. The passage of the Federal-aid highway law on July 1, 1916, of this sum \$75,000,000 is to be expended for the construction of rural post roads and cooperative arrangements with the highways departments of the states, and \$10,000,000 is expended for roads and bridges partly within the national forests. The act limits the Federal Government's share in co-operation with the states to 50 per cent of the total cost of construction. This aid may be extended to the construction of any rural roads, excluding all streets in towns having a population of 2,000 or more, except those of such streets or roads which the houses are, on average, more than 200 feet apart.

A million dollars is made available for expenditure during the year ending June 30, 1921, and thereafter the appropriation is increased at the rate of \$1,000,000 a year until 1921, when the sum provided is twenty millions. In addition, an appropriation of \$1,000,000 a year is made available for the construction of roads and trails partly within the national forests.

DEATH BY LIGHTNING

Warrington, Formerly of Feunty, Killed Instantly at Tulsa, Okla.

While playing golf with friends at Oklahoma, John Warrington was struck by a bolt of lightning and instantly killed. On his death he was standing two feet of him at the time he was terribly shocked by the lightning.
