A STATEMENT OF THE NEWSPAPER PUBLISHERS OF AL-LEGANY COUNTY

To the Public:

The tremendous increase in he cost of everything entering in to the making of a newspaper in recent years is so well known as to need no repetition here. The price of paper has advanced from 50 to 75 per cent, and is still going up; printing inks, from 10 to 500 per cent; type metal, 50 to 80 per cent.; printers' rollers, 20 ot 30 per cent.—and so on down the line.

To equaider the serious problem thus created, which threaten the very existence of country newspapers a most rice of the periods.

To consider the serious pronum inus created, which threatene the very existence of country newspapers, a meeting of the publishers of Allegany County was held a few weeks since. Eleven of the country's fourteen newspapers were represented by the owners, and communications were received from the others. It was found that of the eleven papers personally represented, eight had been published during the past year at an actual loss. Communication with the paper manufacturers of the country brought the rapid that, while the close of the present war might bring some tan, or make the cose of the present war hight bring some temporary relief, a return to anything like former prices was not to be expected, since the increase was really due to a natural short age of raw material and had onlybeen hastened slightly by the European conflict; higher, rather than lower prices, were to be expected in the future. pected in the future.
