Suffrage Department CONDUCTED BY Mrs. Anna Cadogan Etz Upstate Woman Suffrage Press

In Topeka, Kansas, where a woman has received the Democratic nomination for Congress, the registration is the largest in the history of the city, and in three precincts the women outnumbered the men.

The women of Florida are leading in the race for municipal suffrage these days. Last year Florida included suffrage for women in its organization charter. The city council of Cocoa has passed a bill to give women the vote on city affairs. Lakeland and Pensacola are agitating the question, and now comes the news from Delray, Palm Beach, that it is to be listed as the second city in the state to give municipal suffrage to women.

In a platform which the Wheeling Register considers "the greatest declaration of principles ever adopted by the State Democrats" the woman suffrage amendment to the West Virginia Constitution which is to be voted on this fall, is declared to be something that should be ratified at the polls. This out and out endorsement by important political forces must help roll up the affirmative vote in November.

In Nebraska, according to the report of the state labor commissioner, the crops have been harvested without loss because of the help of women. In this emergency no men are mentioned as failing to utilize the work of women because of the conviction that a woman's place is in the home and not in the field.

"I am interested in suffrage vitally. So is he and I agree with him in the matter," so said Mrs. Hughes in a Chicago interview. From which it may be known that woman suffrage has not brought discord into the Republican candidate's family.

First he was silent on the principle; next he endorsed the principle but not the Federal suffrage amendment; next he voted for the principle in New Jersey; and lastly he has admitted that his views might change with reference to the Federal amendment; so runs the official record of President Wilson on the question of votes for women, as recounted in the Boston Transcript by its Washington correspondent.

"Why is a public library like woman suffrage?" asks a Boston paper with a national circulation, and it gives as the answer, "Because once tried it is in the community to stay. It is never a question of 'Shall we give it up?' but only 'Oh, why didn't we have it before!'" ANNA CADOGAN ETZ, Up-State Woman Suffrage Press.
