WALLACE THAYER PRAISES WILSON

Wallace Thayer, Progressive, enumerated the reasons why he is supporting Pres. Wilson in a speech yesterday at the noon-day meeting of the Wilson and Marshall Club in the Law Exchange building, Niagara Street, Buffalo.

"President Wilson has maintained peace, and has maintained it with honor," declared Mr. Thayer. "He has forced wealth to bear its share of the nation's burden through the operation of the income tax. He has solved the tariff question for all time by signing the Underwood bill. He has looked after the welfare of thousands of future citizens by signing the child-labor act.

"President Wilson's masterly handling of the international situation should alone be sufficient reason for returning him to office. I know that hundreds of Progressives recognize President Wilson's progressive principles and will make the recognition mean something by voting for him on election day."

JUDGE JOHN FORD OUT FOR WILSON

Hon. John Ford, for ten years Justice of the Supreme Court of the County of New York has announced that he will vote for Wilson. This announcement is especially interesting to the people of Western New York, for Judge Ford's friends know that he was born and reared in Medina and spent his childhood and young manhood there.

Judge Ford's endorsement of the President takes the form of a letter addressed to Mr. Wilson in which he states as follows:

"Dear Mr. President: You will perhaps recall at the Press Club dinner in New York I told you that I was seriously thinking of voting for you. Well, after months of deliberation, including two months in the solitude of Alaskan mountains, I have finally concluded to do so.

"Since my first vote for Blaine in 1884, I have consistently voted for the Republican candidates for President including Mr. Taft in 1912.

"But this is an election which demands of every citizen the casting off of partisan ties and a merciless search of conscience to determine how his vote may unselfishly and honestly be cast to serve the best interests of the United States of America without regard to the effect it may have upon any other country or foreign interest.

"I have endeavored to bring my mind to view the issues from such a standpoint and have concluded that it is my patriotic duty to vote for you.

"In my opinion it would be most unwise to change the national administration in the midst of this unprecedented world crisis."

"Moreover, I would be false to my lifelong allegiance to the cause of the plain people if I failed to support one, to whom is mainly due the long list of progressive and beneficent laws enacted during your administration."

Justice Ford served two terms in the State Senate as a Republican and was elected to the Supreme Court on the Fusion ticket in 1906.

WILL NOT ACCEPT MILK FROM DEALERS

The Borden Company Discriminates Against Dealers Who Ignored Settlement

Cuba, Oct. 23.—The Borden Condensed Milk Company of New York has sent formal notices to all branch condenseries not to accept milk that has been holding back after the settlement of the milk war between them and the league.

Already milk from large dairies has been refused and the dairymen have been forced to either take their product to the cheese factory or else dump it. The Borden's are receiving their normal supply, sufficient to warrant the needs of the New York City consumers. It is expected that cheese factories will soon close with the product taken to the condenseries but the shrinkage of the dairies and the addition of patrons will later be about equal until late in the winter, when a little shortage will be felt by the condenseries and milk distributors in New York.

Rev. Dr. S. E. EASTMAN, RE-PUBLICAN, IS FOR WILSON

The Rev. Dr. Samuel E. Eastman, popular pastor of The Park Church, of Elmira for many years has decided to vote for the re-election of President Wilson. He has written the following letter to the Star-Gazette explaining why he has reached his conclusion, to support the President. As Dr. Eastman is a deep thinker and has always been a staunch Republican, his views are of unusual interest. He says:

I was the son of an anti-slavery fanatic so naturally became a "Black Republican" as they were called then. I cast my first ballot for General Grant and have voted the Republican ticket every four years since, but I shall vote for President Wilson next November.

First—Because he has seldom opened his mouth in a speech but far in the campaign that he has not pointed out to his audiences some ideal for the betterment of the people or the nation.

Judge Hughes is a great disappointment to me. I admired him greatly as a Governor of New York State although I disliked some of his vetoes and his treatment of the delegates of thirteen thousand or more women who asked to see him, offended me, being a life long advocate of woman suffrage. He refused even to see them. Harriet Stanton Blatch said at the time, "Governor Hughes has ambitions. He never will see us until we can vote his ambitions up or down." Was it a prophecy, I wonder, and now fulfilled?

I shall vote for President Wilson in the second place because he is a pathfinder naturally. He has led us through the forests of difficulty growing out of the submarine method of war used by Germany. It is a brilliant record, a bloodless victory.
