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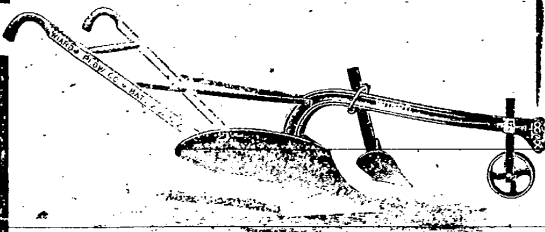

WILSON

President Seems Sure to Re-election this Friday Morning
Republican Chairman admits that Mr. Wilson is Probable Winner in California, Which Will Give Him Enough for Election

WILSON BY 288 ELECTORS
We go to press word comes Wilson has carried California by a majority of from 6,000. This being the case elected without doubt.

ALL OVER" SAYS MCCORMICK

Chairman McCormick re-appeared at the Headquarters this afternoon and said "It's all over." We cleaned them up. We still have to get the original Wilson by 288 electors.

Mr. McCormick added that the presentation was being to protect the ballot boxes, which were running close to New York, Nov. 9.--If the of the incomplete returns today's balloting are accepted in all but four states, the electoral vote would be silent Wilson 256 and Hughes 243.

The doubtful states with the electoral votes are California, Nevada, New Mexico, and North Dakota 5.

The sudden switch of support, which might be considered as doubtful, from all Hughes plurality to Wilson for President Wilson, a dramatic change in the scene of this forenoon. It came in consequence from the Secretary of State that a partial of all the districts disclosed in tabulation by town clerks to that extent.

Ball count is still progressing in Minnesota the incomplete returns show Mr. Hughes to lead which Wilson, in California is reducing, while in North Dakota Wilson is leading. New Mexico is so close as to be as to permit of no election.

The returns from the doubtful states are belated and not expected to be available a late hour to-day. The chairman of the California State Central Committee to-day admitted that Hughes is running behind in that state, but he refused to declare the state to the effect that an election will be necessary. Minnesota Democrats are confident and express confidence in the face of the Hughes lead, that Wilson will win the race.
