WHAT IS BACK OF HUGHES?

Taft's former campaign manager, ex-Postmaster General Hitchcock, whose function in previous conventions has been the delivery of the corrupt Republican delegations from Southern States.

Who is supporting Hughes's candidacy?

Wall Street, the predatory trusts, the tariff beneficiaries, the seekers and holders of special privilege, the exploiters of Mexico, the munition manufacturers, the railroads, the bankers, unified plutocracy, even its women folks, all enemies of fundamental democracy, who hope to prostitute government for selfish gain.
