—Here is said to be the correct way of measuring hay in stacks. If the stack is square multiply the length in yards by the width in yards and then by one-half the height in yards. Divide by fifteen for tons. If the stack is round, multiply the square of the circumference in yards, divide this by 100 and then by fifteen for the number of tons. The usual allowance for a ton of hay is 512 cubic feet.

One of the largest oil deals in years in the Allegheny field was consummated last week when the Forest Oil Co., the members of which are C. G. and F. D. Doran, of Bradford, Pa.; Wm. J. Richardson, Wellsville; and A. E. and J. H. Lesters, of Richburg, purchased the leases of the July 7th Co., including 700 acres with 173 producing wells in Bolivar township and 325 acres with 81 producing wells near Duke Center, Pa. The consideration of the deal is given as about \$250,000.

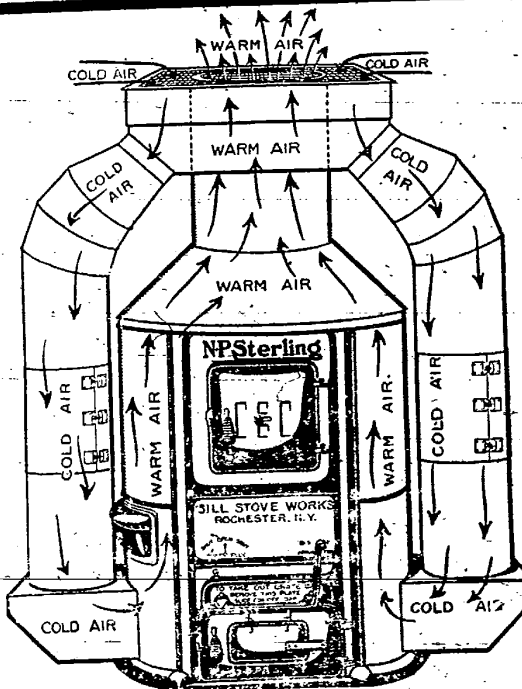
