KNOX IS ELECTED IN PENNSYLVANIA

State Gives Hughes About 200,000 Plurality.

ENTIRE TICKET GOES THROUGH.

Returns Indicate That Democrats Apparently Will Not Increase Their Representation of Six in Congress Late Returns from Other States.

Philadelphia, Nov. 9.—Returns from Pennsylvania indicate that Hughes carried the state by about 200,000 plurality. Returns also indicate that the Democrats apparently will not increase their representation by six in congress.

Phlander C. Knox was elected to the senate by the Republicans by a large plurality and the entire Republican state ticket was successful by a plurality a little less than that of Hughes.

CHAIRMEN CONFIDENT

Both McCormick and Willcox Profess Confidence in Outcome.

New York, Nov. 9.—Tireless vigils were kept by anxious watchers at both Democratic and Republican headquarters last night. Bulletins from states in which the results are still in doubt were scanned even more eagerly than they were Tuesday night.

Both Chairmen Vance McCormick and William R. Willcox professed undiminished confidence in the outcome. The former was somewhat more explicit in his claims, but the latter declared, after dining with Mr. Hughes, that the nominee agreed with him that the Republicans had been successful.

Earlier in the day Mr. McCormick had announced that he had sent telegrams to state and county chairmen in doubtful states, directing them to keep careful guard over the ballot boxes and contents.

Attorney General Gregory visited Democratic headquarters and was closeted with the chairman, but it was asserted his visit was of no special significance. The possibility of an official count being necessary in states where the margin of apparent victory for one candidate or the other, is slight, was freely discussed at both headquarters.

It was pointed out that if the house of representatives became a court of last resort in the election of a president, the present house and not the one elected, would sit in judgment. No formal statements on the subject of recount were made by either.

Leaders of both parties in all parts of the country, especially in the west, were in constant touch by telegraph and telephone with headquarters.

INDIANA. Nov. 9.—Although Hughes was leading by more than 8,000 with only 382 of the 3,143 precincts in the state unaccounted, the Democratic state headquarters last night refused to concede a victory to the Republican candidates.

The Republican candidates for governor and United States senator, with a small number of precincts reported, showed larger pluralities than did the presidential candidates who, according to unofficial returns, has been in the lead in Indiana ever since tabulating began. His lead, ranging around 15,000 last night, had dwindled to a little more than 8,000.

Congressional returns last night indicated that the Republicans probably would have eight representatives in the lower house and the Democrats three, with the contest undecided in the first and fifth districts.

MASSACHUSETTS. Boston, Nov. 9.—The vote of Massachusetts complete was: Hughes 268,361, Wilson 247,327.

For governor—McCall (Rep.), 247,853; Mansfield (Dem.), 230,175.

For senator—Lodge (Rep.), 266,476; Fitzgerald (Dem.), 234,466.

CONNECTICUT. New York, Nov. 9.—The complete vote in Connecticut was: "Hughes, 105,324, Wilson 99,832.

Governor—Holcomb (Rep.), 109,056; Beasley (Dem.), 96,015.

For senator—McLean (Rep.), 105,264; Cummings (Dem.), 97,347.

ILLINOIS. Chicago, Nov. 9.—Late returns outside Chicago swelled the Republican plurality in the state to 161,684 last night with 749 out of 5,369 precincts missing.

Suffrage Wins in South Dakota.

Sioux Falls, S. D., Nov. 9.—Women suffrage as a state issue is believed to have swept into South Dakota with the state-wide prohibition and a Republican ticket.

MINNESOTA Elects Socialist Mayor. Minneapolis, Nov. 9.—Thomas Vatter, who was endorsed by the Socialist party, was elected mayor of Minneapolis.

Pratt Re-Elected to Congress.

Rath, N. Y., Nov. 9.—H. H. Pratt was re-elected to congress by a plurality of 2,600.

Lockport—William J. Gold, Republican, was elected mayor over John R. Earl, Democrat, with a plurality of eight.

Troy—City of Troy complete gives Hughes 7,824, Wilson 8,307. In 1914 the city gave Whitman 7,299 and Seabury 8,028.

Amsterdam—City complete gives Hughes 2,905, Wilson 2,019, Whitman 2,535, Seabury 2,105, Calder, 3,007, McCombs 1,935.

Schenectady county gives Hughes a plurality of more than 2,000 and pluralities of 2,500 to Whitman and the rest of the state ticket.

Auburn—City complete gives Hughes 2,851, Wilson 3,374. Wilson's plurality, 512. In 1912 Wilson carried Auburn by 81 votes.

Syracuse—The city of Syracuse, complete, gives Hughes 18,310 and Wilson 14,202. Whitman's plurality in Syracuse two years ago was 4,935.

Salamanca—Cattaraugus county went Republican by at least 3,000. Whitman led Hughes throughout the county. All Republican nominees win.

Wellsville—Allegany county, complete, gives Hughes 6,151, Wilson 3,184. In 1912 Allegany county gave Wilson 3,631, Roosevelt 2,759 and Taft 2,641.

Franklinville—The largest majority ever given a presidential candidate in this village was registered for C. E. Hughes. The Republican nominee had 272 plurality out of the 771 votes cast.

Albion—Orleans county, complete, 32 districts, gives Hughes 4,949, Wilson 2,513. Dr. Frank H. Lattin, Republican, elected assemblyman. G. F. Thompson, Republican, state senator, re-elected.

Cuba—Every town in Allegany county goes Republican. Hughes carries Fillmore by 142, Friendship 152, Wellsville 416, Belmont 140, Angelica 164, Alfred 186, Bolivar 40, Canadea 102, Belfast 205, Anderson 201 and Rushtord 190.

Corning—Charles E. Hughes carried Corning for president in yesterday's election by 40 votes over Wilson and pluralities were given to all the Republican nominees except for local office. Hughes received 1,404 votes to 1,364 for Wilson. Governor Whitman had 235 plurality over Seabury.

Batavia—Genesee county, complete, gives Archie D. Sanders, Republican candidate for congress, a plurality of 2,775 over David A. White, Democrat.

John Knight, Republican candidate for the state senate, received a plurality of 2,650 in Genesee county over Lewis Benedict, Democrat.

L. H. Wells, Republican candidate for the assembly, is elected over Harry J. Howe, Democrat, by a plurality of 2,650.
