ELMIRANS ENJOY A RIDE WITH FLEEING BANK ROBBER

Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Ferguson of this city made acquaintance of charming youth who turns out to be thief. Officers sought.

The W. H. Ferguson family of 600 West Gray Street and Mr. and Mrs. Miller, of Elmira, had the experience of traveling considerably distant with a bank robber and his wife on their way to Miami, Florida, last week.

The change acquaintance proved to be Mr. and Mrs. Edward Therek, a young couple in their twenties. Therek formerly was a bank messenger in the Valley Forge Bank of Boston, Mass. On Oct. 27 he disappeared with \$21,000 in bonds, \$33,000 in checks and negotiable paper and about \$1,000 in cash.

The Pinkertons and other detective agencies had been employed to locate the young couple. This fact was not known to Mr. and Mrs. Ferguson and

their little daughter, Georgian, when they met the Thereks in Cherkow, S. C. Mr. and Mrs. Ferguson were motoring in their summer home in Miami. The Thereks were bound in the same direction to spend the summer, they said, and Ferguson motored down the coast with their newly made friends, stopping at the same hotels in the evening and starting the same time in the morning.

Mr. and Mrs. Ferguson took a liking to the young bank robber and his wife because of their congenial manner and pleasant ways. Little Georgian Ferguson was much admired by Mrs. Therek and as a result the little girl rode nearly all the distance from Darien, Ga., to Miami in the bank burglar's car.

Neither the Thereks or Ferguson had any idea that secret service men were close on their trail with another automobile. The detectives were about two days behind and did not succeed in catching up with their prey until the Thereks had reached Miami.

The Thereks were first located in Washington, D. C., where they had purchased a Kissell car. Later they sold this automobile and purchased a Colelight with which they began their trip south.

At Miami the detectives sought Mr. Ferguson and made inquiries regarding the Thereks. The officers were told that he and his wife had gone to the Graylyn Hotel.

There Therek was confronted by the police. He did not attempt to deny his guilt and expressed regret that he had been tempted to commit the wrong.

The young man stated that he had destroyed the papers that were not negotiable. He had sold a number of the bonds and was busy spending the \$1,000 in cash taken on his southern jaunt. Mrs. Therek produced a marriage certificate, showing that she had been married to the reckless young bank messenger for several years.

Young Therek was taken to the Miami jail and placed in a cell. His wife was provided with quarters on the second floor. It is not believed by the officials that the young man will make it necessary for them to secure requisition papers to return him to Boston.

Mr. and Mrs. Ferguson were greatly surprised to learn the character of their former motor companions with whom they had struck up such a friendship. Mr. and Mrs. Fred Miller met the Thereks during a portion of the journey and were quite as favorably impressed with them.
