lines has been forwarded to the conservation commission of the state of New York, to be planted in Cayuga lake. The shipment will include trout, black bass, perch and white bass. These are the first fish that have been planted in this lake for many years.

Charles F. Pattigan has resigned as Warden of Auburn prison. The post is expected to go to either George V. Benham of Auburn, former warden of the prison and recognized leader of Cayuga county, or to John P. Jasckel, former state treasurer, of Auburn, with the former candidate's selection favored.

At a session of the board of Steuben county supervisors, held in Bath, a resolution was passed by a vote of 24 to nine, authorizing the purchase of the William Giddens farm, near Bath, as a site for the county tuberculosis hospital, for which an appropriation was voted at the general election in 1915.

Directors of the Western Union Telegraph company at a special meeting in New York, voted a bonus to employees receiving less than \$2,000 a year—seven per cent of their annual salary to those receiving less than \$1,200 and six per cent to those receiving between \$1,500 and \$2,000. Messengers will receive \$25 each.

Farmers who supply North Tonawanda dealers with milk are demanding a higher price for their product with the result that it is likely that the price of milk will shortly be increased from eight to nine cents a quart in the Tonawandas. If the price is raised, it will be the second increase of a cent a quart since last summer.

State Superintendent of Banks Eugene Lamb Richards, in an address at Syracuse, at a meeting of the Association of the State Banks of the State of New York, urged upon the bankers, not only of New York state, but of the nation, to get together and prepare for the keen international competition which is bound to follow the termination of the European war.
