The Misses Smith studied the market reports and studied the soil and decided to raise cabbage. They went into the business in earnest and used every bit of that two acres, setting out about 18,000 plants. The way they cultivated that cabbage made the neighbors gasp. When it was ready for market they sold most of it by the head at fancy prices, and made sauerkraut of the rest and sold that also at fancy prices.

They cleared \$2,400 on those two acres.
