OVER \$100,000 LOANED

Allegheny County Branch of Federal Land Bank Makes Good Growth

At the annual meeting of the Allegheny County Farm Loan Association, recently held at Cuba, it was learned by the members present that the association had increased its business more in the past year than in any other like period. Seven loans have been granted totaling approximately \$30,000 and four others are in the process of closing as a result of the past years work. The Federal Land Bank has now loaned thru the association over \$100,000. The benefits of the long time, easy payment loan, thru the Federal Land Bank is being more appreciated.

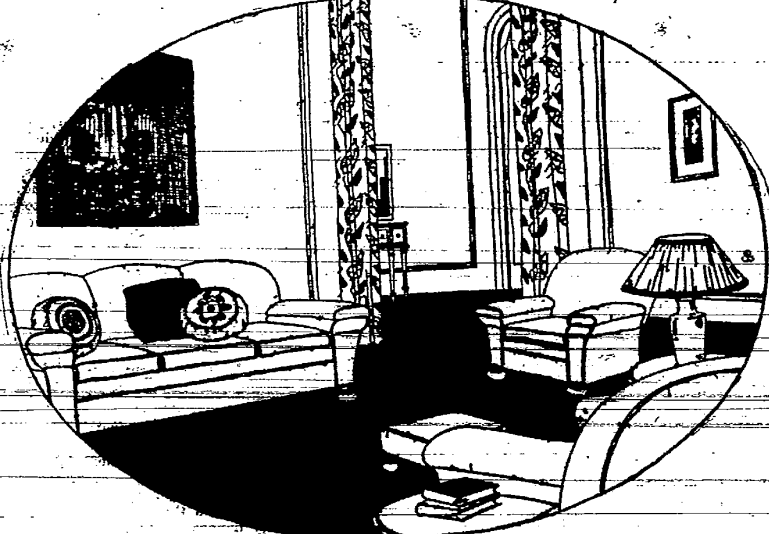

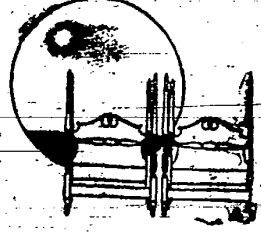
