Pottery Exhibited in Boston

The following paragraph is from the Boston Transcript:

"A small collection of pottery is now on view in the individual exhibition case at the rooms of the Society of Arts and Crafts, 9 Park Street. This work has been sent here from the New York State School of Clay Working and Ceramics of which Professor Charles F. Binns is the head, at Alfred University, Alfred, N. Y. The pottery has been executed by the students under the direction of Marion E. Fosdick, associate professor of modeling, and that of Clara K. Nelson, associate professor of design. It is very creditable to the makers and to their work."

Hitherto the student work of the Ceramic School has had local recognition, but has not been exhibited elsewhere. Therefore this exhibition in Boston is significant of the extension of the prestige of our student work.

By exhibitions at centers of art interest in the larger cities, students can better measure their work on account of the keener competition to be found there.

Exhibitions are to go to other cities later in the year.

LARGE OIL DEAL

Empire Gas & Fuel Co. Buys Large Lease of Dukes in California Hollow

The largest oil and gas deal in the Allegany field for several years was closed a few years ago, when the Empire Gas & Fuel Company of Bolivar purchased the Duke estate oil and gas property in the California Hollow district, Town of Bolivar.

The property consists of 64 producing wells; lease tools and equipment; two houses; 1100 acres of land; quantity of pine, hemlock and hard wood standing timber. Only 200 acres of the tract is under lease, the remaining being in fee.

This tract of land has been owned by the Dukes of Wellsville for many years, they having had the heavy timber cut off, then developed a fine oil and gas property. For the last 15 or 20 years the Empire Gas & Fuel Company has purchased all of the surplus gas from this lease. The Empire also has property adjoining it on two sides, and now, with the acquisition of the Duke property, has a solid block of 1800 acres, all in fee, with hundreds of undrilled locations. It is from 1200 to 1400 foot drilling, with a good depth of Richburg sand.

The new owners will not do any drilling until spring, there being one flood working on the property at present. Will Harder of Alma is the lease foreman. — Bolivar Breeze.
