EXPERIMENT STATION REPORT AVAILABLE

Farmers and others interested in agriculture will find much valuable information in the fortieth annual report of the Geneva Experiment Station just now made available for general distribution. NO BARGAINS IN SEEDS

The seed analysis at the Experiment Station at Geneva urges farmers and others purchasing seed to demand the best in quality and vigor as shown by purity and germination tests. HOLSTEIN PRODUCE 30 POUNDS OF BUTTER IN 7 DAYS

Andover Holsteins are continuing to make good milk and butter production records, as is indicated by the official tests reported from the office of Malcolm H. Gardner, Delaware, Wisconsin, Superintendent of Advanced Registry of the Holstein-Friesian Association of America. This week's bulletin reports the pure bred registered Holstein-Friesian cow, Adele Colantha Mona Jobanna, owned by W. R. Crandall Est. Andover, N. Y., as having made at the age of seven years and eleven months, a record of 588.1 lbs. of milk and 24,220 lbs. of butter fat in seven days, equivalent to 30.2 lbs. of butter. Her 14-day record is 1177.7 lbs. of milk and 46,928 lbs. of butter fat, equivalent to 58.6 lbs. of butter.

It was a beautiful white bird. Coming back after waiting a long while for the reappearance of the bird his former quests and occupations lost their appeal. He could not endure the things which hitherto had given him joy. Setting forth upon the quest he found at the edge of a desert one whose name was "Wisdom-of-the-Ages." "Is there a kind of dazzling whiteness?" he asked. "Yes, there is, and her name is Truth," said Wisdom. "Shall I find?" "You may find — but the quest is far." "At least, I may seek." "Yes, you may seek."

The Quest The Hunter sought thru many fields and snared many birds of beautiful plumage. They were named "Reward-After-Death," "Immortality," "Heavenly Mansions," "Peace," "Rest;" beautiful all of the family of truth, but not the all-truth. The people of his town gathered to see his beautiful birds, and to be ravished by their songs. Many would have erected shrines and been well content. But they had not seen the white bird... they had not heard her song.

After Many Years The people that the Hunter had because he could not be content with the birds he had caught. From desert to mountain he sought, until at last on the last range of the earth-hills on the highest peak he lay dying but his dimming eye reached the heavens. And he saw the flash of wings and a feather fluttered down from the sky, a feather brighter than light, and lay on his breast. He knew that Somewhere he would find that which he sought.

What is Truth? Truth is the "that-which-ought-to-be." For everything in the universe, from sand grain to God is the perfect ideal, the rightness, the completeness. Truth is the ultimate test of all things. Do the word, the deed, the action, attitude, relation that, wish, motive show the rightness that ought to be? Do we wish our status among souls, our place in the universe, to be indicated by that which proceeds from us. Shall we dare send forth that which is not "That-ought-to-be?"

The Imperial Privilege The capability of rightness imparts upon every soul an imperial privilege. The words, obligation, duty, necessity are not words for free souls. Privilege is the word for exalted souls. Leonard's must walk the length of Florence to make a line straighter. He can, Turner must sacrifice fame, money, place to be true to his ideal. Henry Clay must be right rather than president. Every man has the imperial privilege of friendship with his own soul. Val Jean feared the laughter of his own soul. murder of "that-which-ought-to-be" disobedience to light! No consideration of money, place, success can square treason to one's own conscience. Jesus must go to His Hill rather than be false to His ideals. There is Treason. Wherever wrong is found — in individual, government, economics, social relations, religious ideals — it comes about from failure to find or disobedience to the Truth. Wars, religious diversions, social antagonisms, race-prejudice, economic rivalry, false social gradations, with conflicts, hates, wars, exclusiveness, intolerance, bigotry, arrogance of any sort is the spawn of Falseness. A tree is known by its fruits. Jesus the Interpreter to the social order were absolutely right values, the law of human relations, the solution of problems. He revealed the Law of Life. Yet nineteen centuries afterward one would scarcely dream that He had ever been among men. The world has not recognized His values, has not believed in His Kingdom, has not applied His solution to human relationship, has not obeyed. His economic ideals, has not believed in Fatherhood or Brotherhood, has not put into any creed His Law of Life. If all religions are seeking to do the will of God why the hates, the gates, the antagonisms, the rivalries, the actual contempt found everywhere? Can the Will of God possibly mean these things? — Is "that-which-ought-to-be" found in any unfriendly condition as religion, economics, politics, social relationship? This will never be solved so long as capitalism and labor are class conscious. To-day both are visioned by false idealism, capitalism by profits, labor by wages, wrong ideals. When capital and labor declare a merger and operate with the objective of production for common welfare the problem is solved. As a unit, under common laws, governed by legislation as is found in any commonwealth, there will be no antagonism, consequently no problems. Every solution has been tried except that which ought to be.
