

home in Canisteo, Monday evening.  
Mrs. Sedgwick had retired to her  
room on the second floor, and when  
discovered was lying face down on  
the bed with the clothing in flames.  
She had pulled a small open stove  
so close to the bed that the cloth-  
ing had caught fire. Mrs. Sedgwick  
was terribly burned about the head  
and shoulders. She had been a resi-  
dent of Canisteo for many years,  
where she was held in high esteem.

**CLOSE ROAD CROSSING**  
Public Service Commission Order  
Traffic Changed at Erie Cross-  
ing Near Cuba.

Albany, Mar. 20. — The Public  
Service Commission, under an order  
issued to-day, directed that the ex-  
isting under crossing of the Erie  
Railroad on the state highway about  
one mile west of Cuba, Albany  
County, be closed and discontinued  
and travel diverted to a new under-  
crossing to be located about 225  
feet to the west of the present cross-  
ing. The present crossing is 16 feet  
wide and it is approached by sharp  
curves which the commission holds  
makes the undercrossing dangerous  
and that it should be changed. The  
proposed new undercrossing will be  
26 feet wide and the approaches on  
either side will be comparatively  
straight. The railroad company has  
opposed the construction of the new  
undercrossing, claiming that the  
present one was built by order of the  
state about fifteen years ago, and  
that necessity for a new crossing, if  
any, is due to the improvement of  
the new highway.
