

WOULD AMEND HIGHWAY LAW

Assemblyman Jolner has introduced a bill to amend the highway law in relation to track of runners on sleighs. If the measure becomes a law, after Jan. 1, 1924, no sleigh, sled or cutter or bobs drawn by an animal or animals shall be operated on any public highway, unless the runners thereon are built four feet and eight inches apart, measuring between the centers of the shoes. A person thus operating a sleigh, sled or cutter, or bobs which does not comply with the requirements will incur a penalty of \$10 for each day that one or more such offenses occur.

TO EXTEND POWER LINES

Albany, March 20. — The Genesee Valley Power Company, Inc., of Fillmore, under an application made to the Public Service Commission for authority to issue bonds and stock, totaling \$50,000, states that the proceeds will be used in completing its power installation at Wiscoy and the construction of 5 1/2 miles of transmission lines in Friendship township and two miles in Hume and distribution lines in Friendship and Canadea to provide additional facilities for serving its customers.

\$7,000 VERDICK AGAINST VILLAGE OF WELLSVILLE

A decision was handed down Friday by the Appellate Division, Fourth Department, at Rochester, confirming the findings of the Supreme Court jury at Bemont, a few months ago, when a verdict of \$7,000 was rendered against the Village of Wellsville for the death of N. C. Prescott, who was killed thru contact with electric light wires about a year ago. The village took an appeal thru its attorney, Ernest C. Hornburg, from the findings of the jury at the Bemont court, and the result is just known.

Whether there will be a further appeal cannot be determined until after the court decision is known in detail.

CUBA MAN LEADS EUROPEAN TOUR

J. D. Jones, of Cuba, will conduct one of the parties touring abroad, managed by Boston parties this season. Mr. Jones' party will sail on the steamer "Montcalm" from Montreal, June 30th scheduled to arrive at Liverpool July 8th. The itinerary includes Stratford-on-Avon, Warwick, Oxford, several days in London, a visit to Holland, journeying up the Rhine, stopping at Heidelberg and Munich; arriving at Oberammergau for the Passion Play which will be given this year for the first time since 1910. They will motor thru the Bavarian Alps, visit Venice, Florence, Rome, Naples, Pompeii and Milan, also the Swiss lakes. Several days will be given to seeing Paris and the battlefields of France, sailing on the return trip from Antwerp Aug. 16th. Mr. Jones was Y. M. C. A. secretary in France during the war and has traveled extensively in Europe.
