THE U. S. WEEKLY MARKETGRAM

Latest Price Quotations Received from the U. S. Bureau of Markets Covering Produce and Feeds

(Washington, D. C., for the week ending April 3rd, 1922.)

Grain Market unsettled during week and prices fluctuated nervously within 1/4c range. Incentives for buying were unfavorable, crop news from Kansas and Nebraska and new import duty on wheat; depressing influences were larger estimates for Russian crop and lower foreign markets.

Visible supply wheat - 35,897,000 bushels, a decrease of 1,205,000 bushels for week. Visible supply corn 46,889,000 bushels, a decrease of 2,707,000 bushels for week. Closing prices in Chicago cash market: No. 2 red winter wheat \$1.35; No. 2 hard winter wheat \$1.34; No. 2 mixed corn 57c; No. 2 yellow corn 57c; No. 2 white oats 36c. Average farm prices: No. 2 mixed corn in Central Iowa about 43 1/2; No. 1 dark northern wheat in Central-North Dakota \$1.32 1/2; No. 2 hard winter wheat in Central Kansas \$1.18. For the week Chicago May wheat up 1/4c closing at \$1.34 1/2; Chicago May corn down 1/4c at 55 1/2c; Minneapolis May wheat down 1c at \$1.40 1/2; Kansas City May wheat down 1/2c at \$1.19 1/2; Winnipeg May wheat down 1/4c at \$1.34 1/2.

Butter markets unsettled; buyer operating only for immediate needs with result that accumulations have occurred on some markets. Demand for medium and undergrades good, and is attributed to many buyers changing from storage to fresh. Closing prices, 92 score: Philadelphia, 36c; Boston, 36 1/2c; New York 35 1/2c, Chicago, 35 1/2c.

Cheese markets weak; price tendency downward. Business dull as many buyers anticipate lower prices later. Production increasing under more favorable weather. Prices at Wisconsin markets April 1st: Twins and Daisies 18c; Double Daisies 17 1/2c, Young Americas 20c, Longhorns 19 1/2c; Square Prints 20 1/2c.

Live Stock and Meats Chicago hog prices were firm to 15c higher, medium and heavy hogs showing the most strength. Beef steers and butcher cows and heifers generally 25c higher, feeder steers firm to 10c higher, veal calves firm to 25c higher. Fat lambs to 25c higher; feeding lambs unchanged. Yearlings up 25 to 50c; fat ewes up generally 25c. April 3rd Chicago prices: Hogs top \$10.05 (one lad) bulk of sales \$9.90 to \$10.40, medium and good beef steers - \$7.25 to \$8.85; butcher cows and heifers \$4.35 to \$8.25; feeder steers \$5.40 to \$7.35; light and medium weight veal calves \$6.25 to \$9; fat lambs \$13.25 to \$16.25; feeding lambs \$11.75 to \$13.75; Yearlings \$11.75 to \$14.75; fat ewes \$7.25 to \$10.50.

Stocker and feeder shipments from 12 important markets during the week ending March 24th were: Cattle and calves 46,029, hogs 55,903, sheep 41,523.

Eastern wholesale fresh meat prices showed mixed movements. Pork loins advanced \$1 to \$2; lamb firm to \$1 higher. Mutton steady; beef up 50c; veal generally \$1 lower per 100 lbs. April 3rd prices good grade meats: Beef \$12 to \$13.50; veals \$13 to \$16; lambs \$27 to \$30; mutton \$19 to \$22; light pork loins \$23 to \$25; heavy loins \$18 to \$22.

Feed Markets weak. Bran declined \$2.50 to \$3. Heavy wheatfeeds followed the decline. Hominy feed production continues heavy and prices are \$1.50 to \$2 per ton lower in many markets. Linseed meal and cottonseed meal firm, offerings fair demand light. Export demand negligible. Gluten feed and gluten meal demand fair, production heavy. Stocks
