Hay

Warm weather hastening pastures and weakening demand for hay. Prices firm at most markets account extremely light receipts. Improved road conditions and increased loadings indicate larger receipts to come quoted April 8, No. 1 timothy, Boston \$29.50, New York \$31.50, Philadelphia \$23, Cincinnati \$23.50, Chicago \$26. No. 1 alfalfa Memphis \$26, Minneapolis \$23. No. 1 prairie Chicago \$18, Minneapolis \$18.

Feed

Most feed markets dull. No material change in prices. Offerings of wheat and corn feeds continue liberal and slightly excess demand. Wheat feeds now quoted Lake and Rail basis in Eastern markets. Cottonseed and linseed meal firm, demand light. Alfalfa meal steady, offerings light, demand fair. Hominy feed weak and quoted lower. Gluten feed and gluten meal in fair request. Receipts and stocks good, movement fair. Quoted April 8, bran \$20.75, middlings \$22, flour middlings \$24, Minneapolis; 36 c cottonseed meal \$42, Memphis, \$42.50 Atlanta; white hominy feed \$20.50 St. Louis; gluten feed \$32.65 Chicago; Linseed meal \$49.50 Minneapolis, \$50 Buffalo; No. 1 alfalfa meal \$19.50 Kansas City.

Dairy Products

Butter markets have recovered from recent dullness and at close are firm with price tendency upward. Offerings all grades fairly well cleaned up. Closing price 92 score; New York and Boston 36 1/2 c; Cheese Markets weak at lower prices. Declines are seasonal and this appears to be cause of weakness more than actual accumulations on market. No confidence in trading and buyers expect prices to reach still lower levels. Prices at Wisconsin primary markets April 8: Twins 16 1/2 c, Daisies 14 1/2 c, Double Daisies 16 1/4 c, Longhorns 17 1/2 c, Young Americas 18 c, Square Prints 17 1/2 c.

Live Stock and Meats

Chicago hog prices advanced 45c to 60c higher. Cattle prices ranged downward. Beef steers lost 10 to 25c; butcher cows and heifers weak to 25c lower; veal calves down 50 to 75c. Feeder steers practically steady. Sheep and lamb prices considerably lower. Fat ewes being 50c to 81c, yearlings generally \$1 lower and fat lambs from \$2 to \$2.25 down. April 10 Chicago prices: Hogs, top \$11.00; bulk of sales \$10.50 to \$10.95; medium and good beef steers \$7.15 to \$8.75; butcher cows and heifers \$4.35 to \$8; feeder steers \$5.40 to \$7.35; light and medium weight veal calves \$5.75 to \$8.25; fat lambs \$11.25 to \$14; yearlings \$10.50 to \$13.50; fat ewes \$6.75 to \$9.50. Stocker and feeder shipments from 12 important markets during the week ending March 31 were: Cattle and calves 50,551; hogs 9,008; sheep 9,708. Eastern wholesale fresh meat prices show little change. Veal, lamb and mutton practically unchanged; beef firm to 50c higher; light pork loins firm to 50c higher. April 10 prices good grade meats: Beef \$12.50 to \$14; veal \$13 to \$16; lamb \$27 to \$30; mutton \$19 to \$22; light pork loins \$23 to \$26; heavy loin \$18 to \$22.
