USE WINTER VETCH TO GROW MORE HAY

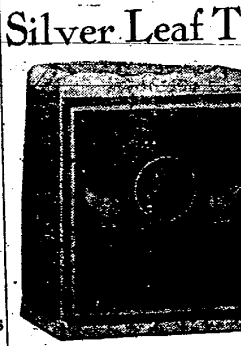
In the face of a prospective shortage of hay this year, the College of Agriculture at Ithaca suggests the seeding of winter vetch with other grasses in oats on sandy or gravelly soils.

Under these conditions, vetch lives over the winter and comes on in the new seeding the next season, the college says. It produces high quality feed and has been known to increase the yield from new seeding 1000 to 2000 pounds an acre.

PROTECTING WOODS HELPS HOME PAPER

Carelessness Which Causes Spring Forest Fires Brings up Cost of Publishing Your Favorite Weekly

A camp fire left smoldering in the woods or a burning cigarette or match carelessly thrown aside is not only a detriment to the success of your favorite newspaper, but is likely to interfere with pulp and paper makers, lumbermen, manufacturers, and the welfare of the nation.

Effect Far-Reaching. Not only is timber destroyed by fires, but usually the forest floor is burned out and game is also destroyed. The floor of humus, called the foundation of the forest, is often burned to the bare rock so that the only trees that will grow on it are briars and pin cherries.
