#### GREEN VEGETABLES BEST SPRING TONIC

There are Bottom Layers of the Iron Which Build Blood Than Fills and Patches.

When it comes to prescribing "spring tonics" every man can safely be his own doctor, provided he is aware that the best spring tonics are green vegetables.

For this reason an ample supply of green vegetables for tonic should be included in the garden and these vegetables, fresh or canned, should have a prominent place on the home table throughout the year.

#### Too Good Dishes

Scalloped onions and peanuts: Cut the onions in quarters; cook them uncovered in boiling salted water until they are tender.

Cheese and dandelion roll: 1 quart dandelion or other greens, cooked and chopped, 1 cup grated cheese, 1 tablespoon butter, 2 tablespoons catsup, 1 tablespoon horse-radish, 1 cup cooked hominy grits.

Combine the ingredients and form the mixture into a roll. Place it on a greased pan and bake it in a slow oven for 25 minutes.

#### NEW YORK NINETEENTH IN TIMBER PRODUCTION

In the fifty years since the Hon. J. Sterling Morton, then Governor of Nebraska, set aside the first Arbor Day, New York has fallen from one of the leading timber-producing states to 19th in the list.

Altho timber production might be expected to decrease as the population increases, the foresters at the State Agricultural College at Ithaca point out that there are now five million acres of unproductive land in the state, most of which might still be producing timber.

In 1872 New York sold large quantities of lumber to other states; in 1919, New York manufacturers paid approximately six times as much for lumber from outside the state as they did for the home-grown product.

In response to a demand from farmers for information on how to plant and care for trees, the State Agricultural College has recently published a bulletin on the subject which it sends free to those who ask for it.

#### FERTILIZING HAY MAY PAY THIS YEAR

Farmers who have timothy meadows that are not too far gone and who are confronted with a possible hay shortage may advantageously fertilize hay land, says the State Agricultural College at Ithaca.

In the past, when fertilizing materials have been about normal prices and hay has been valued at \$12 a ton it has been found that each dollar invested in fertilizer has returned \$2 to \$4 in hay.

#### RAIL REPORT IS OF VALUE TO FARMERS

Ithaca, April — "If New York State farmers want to know just how transportation costs affect prices they receive for their products, they should write to their representative in Congress for a copy of part No. 8 of the report of the joint commission of agricultural inquiry, dealing with transportation," E. V. Titus, director of the New York State Farm Bureau Federation in charge of transportation matters, said here today.

The report covers a wide range of subjects, he pointed out, including railway property, management and labor, economic relation of transportation to agriculture and industry, government regulation, railway finance and credit, inland waterways, coastwise service, motor trucks, express and parcel post.

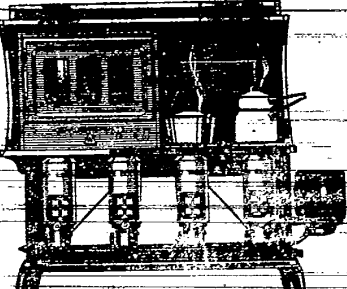
