ONE GEORGE ELLIS IS IN BAD MESS

Check Given Last Fall For Only \$4.00 Causing Young Man Living at Pike, N. Y., Much Trouble

Hornell, April 23. — You can't write checks without having the wherewithal in the bank to meet them and expect to get away with it. George Ellis, aged 20, of Pike, N. Y., did, last fall on a Hornell merchant, and to-day found him staring from a cold, steel cell — enmeshed in the toils of the law.

Court Crier, A. W. Springer, journeyed to Ellis' home at Pike, N. Y., on Saturday and returned him to Hornell on a warrant. The complaint was sworn to by Roy Helmer of Hornell.

Mr. Helmer alleges that in October last Ellis tendered him a check for \$4.00. He accepted it and Ellis was given the equivalent in coin of the realm. The check was returned, sometime afterward marked "no funds," which is to say that Ellis didn't have a "soomarked" in the bank.

Wishing to be reasonable and give Ellis an opportunity to "come thru" he wrote him several letters. These Mr. Helmer said, were entirely ignored by Ellis who didn't even extend the courtesy of a reply. Saturday he swore out a warrant on Ellis charging him with petit larceny before Judge Fay P. Rathbun.

If the matter is settled without Ellis going to jail it will cost him something.

The check is for \$4. Officer Springer paid some \$7 car fare alone in making the trip, besides a charge of \$6 per day for his services — outside-of incidental expenses aggregating something like \$5, so that bill has already totalled well over \$20, exclusive of the \$4 really owed.

THE U. S. WEEKLY MARKETGRAM

Latest Price Quotations Received From the U. S. Bureau of Markets Covering Produce and Feeds

(Washington, D. C., for the week ending April 25th, 1922.)

Grain

Recent advance in grain market well maintained during the week with July touching new high at \$1.30 1/4. Principal market factors were: Bullish crop news both domestic and foreign; higher foreign markets; large export sales new crop hard winter and fair business in manitobas. Visible supply wheat 31,493,000 bushels for a decrease of 1,636,000 bushels for week. Visible supply corn 49,014,000 bushels, a decrease of 4,132,000 bushels for week. Closing prices in Chicago cash market: Number 2 red winter wheat \$1.47; No. 2 hard winter wheat \$1.46; No. 2 mixed corn 82c; No. 2 yellow corn 62c; No. 3 white oats 59c. Average farm prices: No. 2 mixed corn in Central Iowa about 48 1/2c; No. 1 dark Northern wheat in Central North Dakota \$1.49; No. 2 hard winter wheat in Central Kansas \$1.30. For the week Chicago May wheat up 5/8c closing at \$1.46; Chicago May corn up 1/4c at 61 1/2c; Minneapolis May wheat up 1/4c at \$1.55 1/2; Kansas City May wheat up 1/4c at \$1.31 1/2; Winnipeg May wheat up 3/8c at \$1.42 1/2.

generally \$7.50 to \$8 per barrel slightly weaker in Boston. Northwestern extra fancy boxed Winesaps slightly weaker in most Eastern markets at \$2.75 to \$2.75.

Texas yellow onions down \$1 at shipping points at \$1.25. Haulings heavy but decreasing. Northern cities liberally supplied, prices down 1 to \$2 and \$2 to \$2.75 per crate.

Tomatoes, Florida best, sizes up 25c to 50c in New York \$3.25 to \$3.50, supply moderate.

Lettuce supplies heavy in New York; beshels North and South Carolinas \$1.25 to \$1.50 for best.

Live Stock and Meats

Chicago hog prices ranged firm to 15c higher. Beef steers lost 10c to 30c, butcher cows and heifers weak to 1c lower. Feeder steers up 10c; veal calves unchanged. Sharp advances occurred in sheep and lamb prices; fat lambs averaging \$1.25 higher and yearlings ranging from 25c to \$1 higher. Fat ewes were 25c higher. April 24th Chicago prices: Hogs, top \$10.65, bulk of sales \$9.30 to \$10.60; medium and good beef steers \$7.40 to \$8.60; butcher cows and heifers \$4.50 to \$8.25; feeder steers \$5.85 to \$7.60; light and medium weight veal calves \$5.50 to \$7.75; fat lambs \$12 to \$14.75; yearlings \$10 to \$13; fat ewes \$6.75 to \$9.60.

Stocker and feeder shipments from 12 important markets during the week ending April 14th were: Cattle and calves 39,183; hogs 10,509; sheep 7,660.

The trend of wholesale fresh meat prices was upward, altho there was considerable irregularity as between markets. Beef 50c to \$1 higher; lamb up \$2 to \$3; mutton steady at some markets and as much as \$5 higher at others; veal and fresh pork loins practically unchanged. April 24 prices good grade meats: Beef \$13.50 to \$13; veal \$13 to \$16; lamb \$30 to \$32; mutton \$20 to \$22; light pork loins \$23 to \$25; heavy loins \$17 to \$22.

Dairy Products

Butter markets steady to firm; prices 1/2c to 1c higher. Supplies on markets clearing readily, but dealers are selling freely to avoid any accumulation. Closing prices, 92 score: New York 39c; Chicago 38c; Philadelphia 38 1/2c; Boston 39c. Chicago meats have shown slightly more activity at the lower prices prevailing. Consumptive demand good. On Plymouth, Wisconsin cheese exchange to-day declines were slight, closing prices: Twins 13 1/2c; Daisies 14 1/2c; Double Daisies and Longhorns 14 1/2c. Prices at Wisconsin primary markets April 22: Twins 14 1/2c; Daisies 15 1/2c; Double Daisies 15 1/2c; Young Americas 16 1/2c; Longhorns 15 1/2c; Square Prints 13 1/2c.
