(Washington, D. C., for the week ending May 1st, 1922.)

Wheat and Vegetables

Potato markets higher. New York and Northern sacked Round Whites up 6c in Eastern cities at 1.65 to \$2 per 100 lbs. Chicago carlot sales up 40c at \$1.85 to \$2. North Central shipping points up \$1.70 to \$1.75.

Dairy Products

Butter markets steady except at Chicago which turned very weak today and declined 1 1/2c. Light spring production has served to hold markets in steady position, but possibility of seasonal declines expected at any time has kept the undertone nervous.

Live Stock and Meats

Chicago hog prices ranged from firm to 10c higher. Beef and butcher cattle and also feeder steers generally 10 to 15c higher; veal calves up 2c to 50c.

Hay

Eastern hay markets generally firm for best grades of timothy. Lower grades of timothy in poor demand and sold only at material concessions in price.

11,017 MILES OF FEDERAL-AID ROADS COMPLETED TO APRIL

Federal-aid roads completed since 1916 totaled 11,017 miles on March 31, an increase of 8,016 miles during the preceding 12 months, says the Bureau of Public Roads, United States Department of Agriculture.
