Time Start May 25th — A Year's Project

Contestants: Any boy or girl 10 to 16 or recommended by a breeder.

Calves: Purebred heifer calves under four months of age from herds tested for tuberculosis within a year. Calves to be secured near contestant by Breeders Club Committee, County

Agricultural Agent, and parent of charge, and assist in any other way possible.

County Agents and Alfred State School Agents to assist in purchase of calves, to aid in shipping contestants and calves for them in home locality. To arrange tests of animals and see that they are properly judged.

Breeders Clubs Agree: To find contestants to assist in buying calves, assist in supervision by at least two visits of a local representative in first three months, to breed calf free of

charges. Individuals. Exhibit at fairs as required.

Prizes arranged by each breed. Record of years/age of calf.

Prizes given locally to be used only for local contestants. All breeds competing, basis of years good work and records. Banks are asked to contribute \$8.50 for each local contestant. Several have already promised.
