GARDEN TALKS

mt Spring Tonics Come Out the Ground. Parsaips Grow Slowly

Parentys require the whole season for their growth and may wall be placed, together with selsify, at one side of the garden where they can remain undisturbed. Working the soil deep and fine heige long, straight well-shaped roots to develop, say the gardeners at the Siate Agricultural College at Ithaca. The seed is slow in germinating and the top soil often dries out too much before it is up. It is necessary, therefore, to sow rather thickly. Radishes are often planted with the parsnips as they germinate quickly and mark the row so that cultivation may begin early. Thinning should leave the plants about four inches apart. Hellow Crown is the variety almost universally grown.

Onions Test Ability.

If you are a beginner in gardening, plant onion sets instead of onion seeds, is the advice of the State Agricultural College gardeners. Raising prions, successfully from seed they call a reasonably good test of the amateur gardener's ability. The soil must be fairly good and its prepara-The tion and fining must be thore. seeds germinate slowly, and if seeds germinate slowly, and if the surface soil dries out they will fail to come up. The spot chosen for onions, therefore, should be level and preferably low. Seeds are planted about half an inch deep in heavy soil and deeper in sand, even up to one inch. The rows should be about fifteen inches apart for hand hoes or wheel hoe working and the seedlings thinned to stand about three inches apart. Weeding should be frequent and thoro as the seedlings cannot stand competition from weeds. The college has found Globe Danyers.

POTATO SEED TREATMENT

The importance of potato seed treatment can not possibly be over-emphasized. For the past five years the Farm Bureaus of this state have conducted approximately 200 seed treatment demonstrations with results varying from nothing to as high as 150 husheds increase per acre. The average increase on these demonstraas 160 hushes increase per acre. The average increase on these demonstrations has been about 19 bushels. In addition to the actual increase in bushels per acre there has been a further advantage in the test in that the potatoes from the tested plots have been smoother and evener.

It is so inexpensive and so easily done that it seems very queer that a control many more potato growers do in not treat their seed. The cost of the moperation has been figured in a great many cases and it has been found that the cost of material very seldom be exceeds 4c per bushel and the cost of the time slightly more than this, thus a making the total cost per acre very small. It is not recommended that anyone go into this with an idea of being a cure-all for their potato stroubles, but that they treat a small acreage of the seed to be planted this I year as a demonstration on their own farm. It will then not be necessary sfor them to read results in other sections another year.
