Quoted May six: Spring bran and standard middlings \$30.50 Philadelphia, \$25.50 Chicago soft winter bran \$22 Kansas City; gluten feeds \$22, \$22.65 Chicago; hominy feeds \$22, St. Louis, 26 per cent cottonseed meal \$34 Atlanta, \$45 Memphis, alfalfa meal \$19 Kansas City.

Grain

Market firm first half of week on lighter receipts and many deliveries smaller than expected, but reaction on the 4th carried prices down, and close was lower than a week ago. Chicago July wheat down 4c closing at \$1.24. Chicago July corn down 1c at 64¢ closing prices in Chicago cash market: No. 2 Red Winter wheat \$1.37; No. 2 Hard Winter wheat \$1.37; No. 2 mixed corn 62c; No. 2 yellow corn 63c; No. 3 white oats 39c. Average farm prices: No. 2 mixed corn in Central Iowa 49¢; No. 1 dark Northern wheat in Central North Dakota \$1.36 1/2. No. 2 hard winter wheat in Central Kansas \$1.23. Visible supply wheat 31,003,000 bushels, a decrease of 278,000 bushels for week. Visible supply corn 32,708,000 bushels, a decrease of 2,856,000 bushels for week. For the week Minneapolis July wheat down 4c closing at \$1.41 1/2. Kansas City July wheat down 4c at \$1.15 1/2.

Dairy Products

Butter markets are slightly firmer at higher prices following the decline this past week. Stocks are kept well cleared in anticipation of lower prices as receipts increase. Closing prices 92 score: Chicago 35c; New York 37c; Boston 37 1/2c; Philadelphia 38c. Cheese markets steady to firm and prices are practically unchanged. New cheese is in better demand. Prices at Wisconsin primary markets May 6: Square Prints 17c and other styles range from 15 1/2 to 16 1/2c.

Live Stock and Meats

Chicago hog prices showed advances ranging from 15c per 100 lbs.; beef steers 10 to 25c higher; butcher cows and heifers firm to 25c higher. Feeder steers firm to 15c higher; veal calves 25c to 75c higher; sheep and lambs lower. Fat lambs 40c to 5c to 85c; yearlings 50 to 75c; fat ewes 50c to \$2 per 100 lbs. May 8th Chicago prices: Hogs, top \$10.95; bulk of sales \$10.25 to \$10.90; medium and good beef steers \$7.75 to \$8.85; butcher cows and heifers \$4.85 to \$6.00; feeder steers \$6.15 to \$7.75; light and medium weight veal calves \$8.25 to \$8.75; fat lambs \$11.50 to \$14; spring lambs \$13.50 to \$16.50; yearlings \$9 to \$12.25; fat ewes \$5 to \$8.50. Stocker and feeder shipments from 12 important markets during the week ending April 28 were: Cattle and calves 55,694, hogs 10,547, sheep 8,319. With the exception of veal Eastern wholesale fresh meat prices were weak to lower than those of a week ago. Good land firm to \$2 lower; beef and fresh pork loins steady to 50c lower. Mutton generally steady; veal firm to \$1 higher. May 8th price good grade meats: Beefs \$13.50 to \$15; veal \$13 to \$19; lamb \$29 to \$32; mutton \$20 to \$24; light pork loins \$24 to \$27; heavy loins \$18 to \$23.

Fruits and Vegetables

Pot markets lost about two-thirds of the gain of the preceding week under continued heavy supplies. New York and Maine round Whites weakened in Eastern markets to \$1.50 to \$2 per hundred lbs. Chicago carlots sales down 25 cents at \$1.60 to \$1.70. North Central shipping points down 10c to \$1.65. Maine shipping points down 25c closing 85c to 95c. Florida barrels steady in Northern markets mostly \$6 to \$7 per bbl.; down 50c shipping points at \$5 f. o. b. weeks shipments 4148 cars old, 160 new. Strawberries, Carolinas, Virginias and Tennessees: In heavy supplies

down 10c to 15c at 12c to 20c per quart; 20c to 28c in Boston. Arrivals at New York and Middlewestern markets.

Texas Yellow Onions. Slow prices firm in Northern markets at \$2.50 to \$2.75 per crate. Arrivals heavy at Chicago, New York and Pittsburgh.

Florida Tomatoes. Best sizes steady in New York at \$4.25 to \$4.50.

North Carolina Head Lettuce. Best bushel hampers in New York \$1.75 to \$2; Virginias \$2.25 to \$2.25.

Hay

Prices for higher grades firm account scarcity of good timothy. Poorer grades which comprised 75% or more of the receipts were weak and almost unsalable in some markets. Clover was also slow sale. New alfalfa causing lower prices in Southwestern alfalfa markets. Quoted May: No. 1 timothy Boston \$31, New York \$32.50, Philadelphia \$24.50, Pittsburgh \$25, Cincinnati \$23.50, Chicago \$27, St. Louis \$26, Atlanta \$30. No. 1 alfalfa Memphis \$27.50, Atlanta \$32, St. Louis \$26, Kansas City \$22. No. 1 Prairie Minneapolis \$17.50, Chicago \$18, Omaha \$13.50, Kansas City \$12.

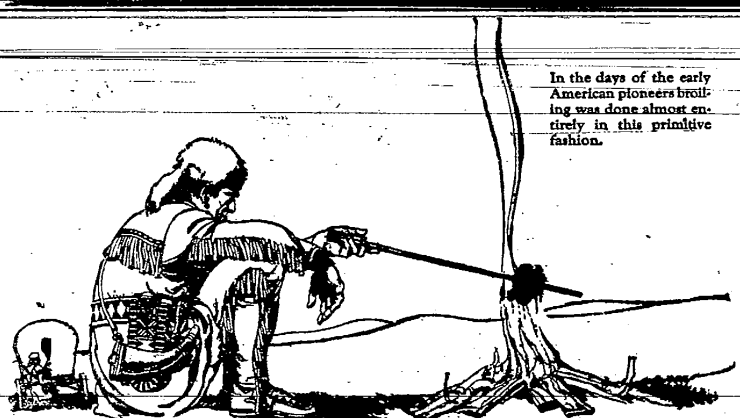

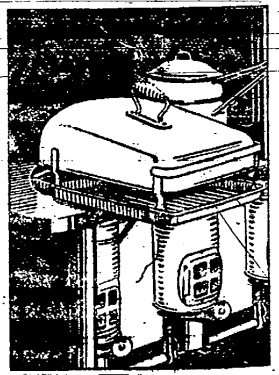
