Latest Price Quotations Received From the U. S. Bureau of Markets Covering Produce and Feeds

(Washington, D. C., for the week ending May 15th, 1922.)

Hay
 Prices generally firm in Eastern consuming markets where receipts of good hay were scarcely equal to the demand, poor grades dull. Demand in Southern and Central Western markets slow. Receipts in distributing markets not large but slightly in excess of the demand and caused prices to decline about 1¢ per ton. Quoted May 13th No. 1 Timothy Boston and New York \$32, Philadelphia and Pittsburgh \$25, Chicago \$26, Minneapolis \$22, Standard Memphis \$25, No. 1 prairie Chicago \$19.50, Minneapolis \$17.50.

Feed
 Wheat feeds dull and lower. Demand very light. Linseed and cottonseed meal dull with prices fairly steady. Corn feeds firm with an active demand for both gluten and hominy feed. Beet pulp in light supply. Quoted May 13th, Spring bran Chicago \$23, Philadelphia \$27.50, standard middlings 25c over bran; linseed meals \$5, Minneapolis \$49 Edgewater, N. J.; 36 per cent, cottonseed meal \$43.50 Memphis;

gluten \$32.85 Chicago; beet pulp \$44; hominy \$28.50 New York.

Fruits and Vegetables

Potato market slightly weaker under continued heavy supplies. Maine Green Mountains weakened to \$1.35 to \$1.85 per 100 lbs. in Eastern markets. Chicago carlot sales down 10¢ to 15¢ at \$1.45 to \$1.60. North Central shipping points down 20¢ to 25¢ at \$1.40 to \$1.45. Maine f. o. b. shipping points steady at 85¢ to 95¢. Florida barrels down \$1 at \$4 per bbl. f. o. b. Hastings. Week's shipments 2560 cars old, 1725 new. Carolina, Virginia and Tennessee strawberries in heavy supply down 2¢ to 3¢ at 15¢ to 18¢ per quart; 15¢ to 20¢ in Boston. Arrivals heavy at New York and Middle Western markets. Texas Yellow Onions dull, weak in Northern markets at general jobbing ranges \$1.50 to \$2.25. Arrivals heavy at New York, Philadelphia and Chicago.

Florida Tomatoes best sizes down 25¢ to 50¢ at \$3.75 to \$4 in New York. North Carolina Head Lettuce ordinary condition \$1.50 to \$2 bushel hampers in New York.

Live Stock and Meats

Chicago hog prices ranged from \$5 lower to \$15 higher, better grades showing the decline. Beef steers were off 20 to 25¢; butcher cows and heifers 10 to 25¢. Feeder steers showed a 10¢ net advance; veal calves up \$1 to \$1.25. Fat lambs dropped 75¢ to \$1; yearlings steady on the lower grade but \$1 lower on better grades; fat ewes steady to 75¢ higher. May 15th Chicago prices: Hogs, top, \$1.90 to \$10.90; bulk of sales

\$10.35 to \$10.85; medium and good beef steers \$7.50 to \$8.65; butcher cows and heifers \$4.75 to \$8.50; feeder steers \$6.25 to \$7.85; light and medium weight veal calves \$7.25 to \$10; fat lambs \$10.75 to \$13.10; spring lambs \$13.50 to \$15.50; yearlings \$8.50 to \$11.25; fat ewes \$5 to \$7.75. Stocker and feeder shipments from 12 important markets during the week ending May 5 were: Cattle and calves 52,050; hogs 12,568; sheep 9,593. Eastern wholesale fresh meat prices declined on all classes. Beef ranged from weak to 50¢ lower; veal weak to \$1 lower; pork loins and mutton \$1 to \$2 lower; dropped \$2 to \$4. May 15th prices good grade meats: Beef \$13.50 to \$14.50; veal \$13 to \$18; lamb \$25 to \$30; mutton \$18 to \$23; light pork loins \$23 to \$26; heavy loins \$17 to \$21.

 Butter markets unsettled during week, but steady to firm at close. Some very sensitive account seasonal influences. Closing prices 92 score: New York 36 1/2, Chicago 35 1/2, Philadelphia 37, Boston 37.

Cheese market steady to firm, trading active at both points and distributing centers. Prices at Wisconsin primary markets May 13th: Twins 15 1/2¢; Double Daisies 16¢; Longhorns 16¢; Young Americas 16 1/2¢; Square Prints 17 1/2¢.

 Chicago July wheat unsettled and erratic, but undertone firm and close was slightly higher. Light trade and narrow price range were principal factors. Chicago May wheat advanced 5¢ closing at \$1.43. Visible supply wheat 27,986,000 bushels, a decrease of 3,017,000 bushels for week. Visible supply corn \$1,856,000 bushels, a decrease of 852,000 bushels for week. Closing prices in Chicago cash market: No. 2 Red Winter wheat \$1.43; No. 2 Hard Winter wheat \$1.43; No. 2 mixed corn 59¢; No. 2 Yellow corn 59¢; No. 3 White oats 40¢.
