Alfred University

In a dual track meet, held last Saturday, at Allegheny, St. Bonaventure defeated Alfred University 53 1/2 to 50 1/2. St. Bonaventure proved to be the stronger in the sprints, while Alfred had little opposition in the distance events, capturing all three places in all runs from the 440 yd. to the two-mile. In the field events, St. Bonaventure succeeded in winning enough points to capture the meet by the narrow margin of three points.
Record breaking crowds are expected to attend the Interscholastic Track Meet to be held here Wednesday, May 17th. Nearly 300 men representing over 20 high and prep schools of this section are entered and several records will undoubtedly be lowered. There has been an amazing revival of track athletics in the high schools and the interest shown in Alfred's big field day makes keen competition for honors a certainty.
