Live Stock and Meats
Chicago hog prices declined 10 to 15c. Beef steers and butcher heifers up 10 to 15c, cows practically unchanged. Feeder steers weak to 25c lower; veal calves averaged about steady. Fat lambs and yearlings weak to 50c lower; fat ewes down 40c to \$1. Spring lambs steady. May 22nd Chicago prices: Hogs, top \$10.75; bulk of sales \$10.25 to \$10.75; medium and good beef steers \$7.65 to \$8.75; butcher cows and heifers \$4.75 to \$8.50; feeder steers \$6.10 to \$7.85; light and medium weight veal calves \$7.50 to \$9.75; fat lambs \$10.25 to \$13.10; spring lambs \$13.50 to \$15.50; yearlings \$8.50 to \$10.75; fat ewes \$4 to \$7.35. Stocker and feeder shipments from 12 important markets during the

week ending May 12th were: Cattle and calves 55,192; hogs 10,885 sheep 16,604. Price movements in Eastern wholesale fresh meat markets were rather irregular. Veal firm to \$1 higher; beef steady, lamb and fresh pork loins weak to \$1 lower, mutton weak to \$2 lower. May 22nd prices good grade meats: Beef, \$13.50 to \$14.50; veal \$24 to \$18; lamb \$25 to \$29; mutton \$18 to \$21; light pork loins \$22 to \$25; heavy loins \$16 to \$21.

Hay
Choice grades of timothy scarce in most markets causing a brisk demand and firm prices for that quality. Lower grades constituted bulk of receipts. Clovers and alfalfa in slow demand because of pasturage and nearness of new hay in Southwest. 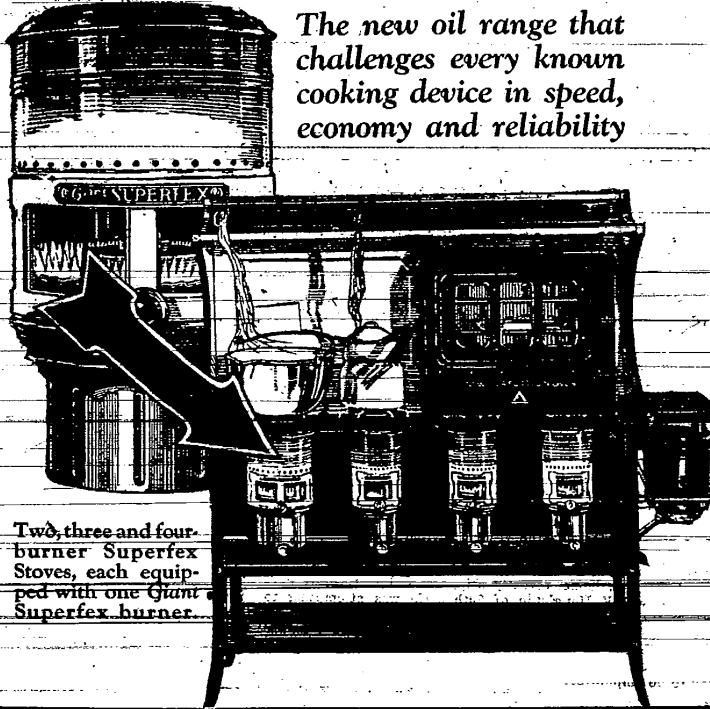
