Origen Considered One of the Greatest of the Early Church Fathe Upheld Christian Faith.

Origen, surnamed Adamantius, who lived from 185 to 254 A. D., is lived from 185 to 254 A. D., is con-sidered by some authorities as the greatest of the early church fathers, Alexandria, in Egypt, the great seaf of learning of the time, is thought to have been his birthplace. He was a teacher and deep student of phi-losophy and of the Scriptures, and he hearms a great defeuder of the he became a great defender of the Christian faith. His literary produc-tions were numerous and several have come down to the modern world. Davis Hill
