VETERANS' RELIEF NOW WORKING

W. H. Mackenzie is Deputy Commissioner and Ready to Handle Claims of All in Allegany County

The Swift-Brundage "War Veterans' Relief" bill, passed by the last Legislature, became law with the signature of Governor Miller.

The measure carries an appropriation of \$1,000,000 for the temporary relief of disabled veterans of the World War. It also creates a relief commission consisting of the Adjutant General, the Attorney General and the comptroller. The commission has named Colonel Henry J. Cookinham, Jr., of Utica, as executive director of the relief work and Major E. S. Martin, of Oswego, as assistant director. One Deputy Commissioner is appointed in each Assembly District, who will serve without pay.

Every honorably discharged veteran of the military or naval service of the United States may file with the Deputy Commissioner of the assembly district in which he resides his verified petition upon a blank to be provided by the Deputy Commissioner, showing:

First - That the applicant resided in the State of New York on the 11th day of April, 1922.

Second - That the applicant served in the military or naval forces of the United States at some time between April 6, 1917, and November 11, 1918.

Third - That the applicant is suffering from sickness or disability.

Fourth - That such sickness or disability was incurred in the military or naval forces of the United States (or necessarily between the dates above mentioned) or as a result thereof.

Fifth - The applicant has been without regular employment for a period of 14 days next preceding his application for relief.

Sixth - That the applicant does not receive aid from the United States Government in the amount of \$30.00 or more a month for those without dependents and \$45.00 or more a month for those with dependents.

Seventh - If with dependents, who they are, and how dependent. A claimant to be entitled to this aid must have been physically within the state and resided therein on the 11th day of April, 1922.

With his application each applicant shall file with Deputy Commissioner his honorable discharge, or certified copy thereof, together with proof by affidavit, executed by a duly licensed physician, showing in detail the sickness or disability of the applicant.

A qualified applicant is entitled to \$30.00 or \$45.00 a month dependent upon whether or not he has dependents. If he is receiving less than this amount from the United States Government he is entitled to the difference between the sum received and the amount stated above.

Funds are now available for the needy veterans of Allegany County, and, as it is the desire of the commission to assist them in obtaining relief, it is hoped that all qualified veterans will apply at the Willets & Paul Corp. office, No. 4, Genesee Street, Belmont, where they can secure the necessary applications and obtain information in detail regarding the fund.
