A warning against the possibility of another outbreak of foot and mouth disease among livestock in New advantages with society equal varies comes from the State Agricultural College at Ithers this week. It advises divectock man not to allow hay and straw used to pack imported grockery, and other goods, to come near susceptible animals.

The virus which produces the disease seems also to be carried in the clothing and other belongings of immigrants, so the college warns owners to keep close watch for signs of the disease in all animals tended by immigrant laborers recently arrived. The records of the federal bureau of animal industry show that foot and mouth disease appeared in 966 herds in Great Bristin Slove from January 1st to March 5th, 1922, requiring the slaughter of 43,735 animals. In Europe and South America the disease persists more or less continuously. Both federal and state officials are annous to prevent another serious outbreak of the disease in this country.
