COUNTY BOND ISSUE

At a meeting of the Board of Supervisors held at Belmont, May 26th, it was voted to approve the proposed bond issue of \$250,000 to pay the county's share of the system of town and county highways that are now building and are to be completed this year. The bonds will bear 4 1/2 per cent interest and are to be issued in denominations of \$1,000 each. County Treasurer D. S. Burdick expects that the bonds will sell at a small premium.

WAYLAND DEDICATES MEMORIAL BUILDING

Soil at Chateau Thierry Mingled With Mortar at Laying of Cornerstone in Memory of Hero

Wayland, N. Y., May 28th -- Before an audience of four thousand people impressive ceremonies of the laying of the cornerstone of the Memorial Building of the American Legion were carried out here today. Seldom, if ever, has such large delegations visited Wayland, and their appreciation of the ritualistic ceremonies was manifested by their quiet demeanor and reverence.

Post colors in profusion mingled with the National Standard gave evidence of the representation of the various Legion Posts which had gathered with their comrades to assist in the exercises. In full uniform came Dansville, Atlanta, Cohocton, Bath, Corning, Hornell, Addison and Painted Post together with representatives from Buffalo, Brockport, Geneseo, Naples and Mt. Morris. The Ladies Auxiliaries sent a large delegation to join with the local chapter who assisted in serving mess to the hungry Gobs and Doughboys. Without question it was the largest gathering of Legionnaires and Auxiliaries that has ever happened in Steuben County. To the excellent work of the Auxiliaries is due much of the pleasure of the day.

Promptly at 2:30, headed by the Avoca Band, the procession of Legion and Auxiliary Posts marched down Naples and Main Streets to the site of the new building where improvised stands, decorated with flags and bunting seated the speakers, Post and Auxiliary Commanders, Color Bearers and Guards, as well as representatives of the G. A. R., Spanish War Veterans, Sons of Veterans and the Wayland Village Board.

The ceremonies opened with the singing of "America" and after a prayer by Chaplain Kinkead of the John P. Eaton Post of Corning, the Rev. W. A. Starkhouse of this village made the address of welcome. The Capron, as Master of Ceremonies, introduced Chairman R. C. Hill of the Seventh District who in turn presented State Commander William F. Deegan and Assistant Hugh Robertson, both of whom had postponed pressing duties at State Headquarters in New York City to be present at this occasion. INHUMAN TREATMENT TO A YOUNG DAUGHTER

Jeanette Dexter, of Hallsport, Found in a Pitiable Condition at Home and Taken to Hospital

Jeanette, the ten-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Dauphin Dexter, of Hallsport, is in the Memorial Hospital in a pitiable condition waiting for the county authorities to take her the state institution at Sonyea.

The story told of the girl is: that she was found at the home, near Hallsport, last Sunday. She was moaning and groaning when discovered by State Troopers, who, presumably, had received complaint of the girl's treatment. It is alleged the girl was crawling on the floor of the house, with apparently nothing in the house to eat or drink, with the exception of a basin of dirty water. She was locked in the room where she was found, and her parents had gone away. How long she had been there is not known. The girl was nearly starved. From evidence that has come to light since she was taken to the hospital she had been subsisting upon pieces of paper.

The girl is a victim of epileptic fits, is demented and cannot talk. She is in a very filthy condition, and from appearance of her body has not had a bath in years.

The county authorities were notified of the case and steps have been taken to have her sent to the State Institution at Sonyea, a home for the feeble-minded and epileptics.

If the story as told is half true, not only should the girl be cared for, but some punishment should be meted out to the inhuman parents. -- Wellsville Reporter.
