GARDEN TALKS

The Best Spring Tonics Come Out of the Ground. Turnips Need Good Soil.

If your soil is poor, plant something else rather than turnips, is the advice of the gardeners at the State College of Agriculture. Turnips must have a good rich soil so that they will grow quickly. They are tough in texture, and strong in flavor if they come on slowly. For a spring crop, plant turnips as early as the soil can be worked, covering the seed not more than one-half inch. Make rows twelve to eighteen inches apart and thin plants to stand about three inches apart in the row. The plants thus pulled may be boiled for greens. White Milan and Purple Milan are recommended as good varieties by the State College of Agriculture. Ruta Baga variety should not be planted in the spring.

Onion Sets Grow Easy. Onion sets are almost fool proof. Anyone can successfully bring them to the green-onion stage. (Press them right-side-up-into-prepared soil and cover them lightly. They should be spaced two or three inches apart in the row. A white variety called Silver skin is most commonly grown for onion sets, but yellow and red varieties are sometimes used.)

June Ration Service. The following is the June ration mixture for cows on pasture suggested by the animal husbandry workers at the State College of Agriculture at Ithaca: 400 pounds hominy, 300 pounds wheat bran, 200 pounds gluten feed, 100 pounds cottonseed meal.

MORE LIME WOULD HELP MOST CLOVER PATCHES

Clover which doesn't come well in most cases hindered by lack of lime, according to the State Agricultural College at Ithaca. It cites also several other causes, among which are winter-killing of southern grown seed, inadequate drainage, and too heavy seeding of the nurse crop.

LAST WEEK'S RAIN HELPED ALL CROPS

Heavy rains were general Friday and Saturday over all sections of the state, excepting the extreme Western counties where only light to moderate showers occurred and more rain is needed to facilitate plowing, according to the summary of weather and crop conditions for the week ending June 6th, sent out from the Ithaca office of the weather bureau. Except for two cool rainy days the weather was warm with an abundance of sunshine. The rainfall greatly benefited all crops and their general condition continues satisfactory; the strawberry crop was particularly helped by the precipitation. The planting of corn and potatoes is nearing completion and their cultivation has begun over the Southeastern counties. Wheat and rye are reported as favorable and oats look especially well. Hay is generally good, and alfalfa in Orleans County is reported to be ready to cut.

BEST TEST RUBBERS USED FOR CANNING

Old or poor-canning rubbers can be detected, according to the specialists at the State Agricultural College at Ithaca, and some fruit and vegetables thus saved from spoiling, by two simple tests. Poor rubbers spoil more canned stuff than any other one cause, they say.

A good can rubber returns to its original shape after it has been stretched out by pulling like a rubber band. Neither will good live rubbers crack when they are folded double into shape of a half circle.

Don't use any rubbers that won't withstand these tests for your fruits and vegetables if you expect them to keep well, is the advice of the college specialists.

WOOL PRICES

The Allegany County Sheep Breeders Co-operative Association has just received word from the State Association giving the final figures on settlement of the 615,000 pounds of the 1921 wool pool in New York State. Allegany sheep breeders had approximately 33,000 pounds of wool in this pool. The prices received for this wool ranged from 22 1/2c per pound for the rejects to 44c per pound for the Delaine. The average for all wool sold was approximately 36 1/2c per pound. The advantages of the co-operative undertaking is clearly indicated by comparison with the price received for most wool sold ungraded last spring which was in general about 20c per pound.

GREAT WRITERS WHO COPIED

Both Shakespeare and Moliere Were Free in Their "Adaptations" From Other Authors.

No authors have ultimately attained to a truer originality than Shakespeare and Moliere, an originality both of form and of content. Shakespeare was able to give us at least the final model of modern tragedy, and Moliere succeeded in perfecting the final model of modern comedy.

Moliere's earliest pieces are so closely in accord with the tradition of the Italian comedy of masks that the "Bourgeois" for example, might be held up for study as the finest specimen of the species. The Italians supplied him with a ready-made mold into which he could pour whatever he had of his own.

Shakespeare started out also as a humble imitator, not of an exotic form, such as tempted Moliere, but of several specific predecessors in his own language. He was obviously original in his early pieces, even in "Love's Labor Lost," almost the only play of his the actual source of which has not yet been discovered. In "Love's Labor Lost" he was imitating Lyle; in "Titus Andronicus" he was imitating Kyd; in "Richard III" he was imitating Marlowe; Pittsburgh Dispatch.

How Game of Bridge Got Its Name.

The modern game of auction bridge is a descendant of old Russian whist, and came to its name in a peculiar way about 40 years ago. At that time there lived at Great Dalby, Leicestershire, England, two families devoted to the game. They paid each other visits on alternate nights. Their way lay across an old rickety bridge, dangerous to travel after nightfall. So often did one neighbor say to the other in parting: "Thank goodness it is your bridge tomorrow night," that in time they referred to their game only as "bridge." And thus the new name became popular in the countryside, and was later accepted throughout England, and soon followed to America.
