**YORK WOMAN HAS PASSED THE CENTURY MILESTONE**  
Miss Charlotte Walker Still Retains Her Faculties

Miss Charlotte Walker, of York, on April 4th, celebrated her 100th birthday anniversary at her home where she received many calls and congratulations from friends who also brought many tokens of esteem.

Notwithstanding her advanced age she is able to "walk about" her room with the aid of a cane and occasionally does some baking in order that she may not forget her culinary art at which she was once quite proficient. She reads her Bible and the newspapers without glasses.

Miss Walker resides with her nephew, James McGregor, and two nieces, Miss McGregor and Nettie Walker.

Miss Walker in early life made a profession of religion in the United Presbyterian Church and has since been a member of the church of that faith in York. The Women's Missionary Society of the church held its monthly meeting Tuesday and united with others in sending to Miss Walker a basket of 122 separate gifts which she may open at her leisure. Besides these came telegrams of congratulation, letters and cards. One gift was a potted plant, a marguerite, bearing 150 blossoms. "It is just like Christmas," Miss Walker said.

James Walker, her father, was a native of Scotland, who settled in the then wooded wilderness near Cazenovia, N. Y., when Washington was President. Here, Miss Charlotte was born, the youngest of nine children three sons and six daughters, of whom she is the last. When Miss Walker was ten years old the family came to Caledonia, remaining one year, going thence to a farm a few miles west of York which Miss Walker still owns. For those times she was one of the few well educated women of the community, graduating from Ingham University in LeRoy in 1840. For a year she taught school in Michigan and after that resided in Canada for a time, but soon returned to her old home in York where she has since resided.

"W" work, good healthy food, and the kind hand of Providence," Miss Walker says has brought her without any serious illness thru her whole life to see this great age. She is able to read large print without glasses, but uses a reading glass when studying a finely printed Bible or reading the ordinary newspaper.

It is rather singular that she and Rev. Peter McNab, another venerable resident of York, who was 100 years old January 5th, and who passed away March 8th, were close friends nearly their whole lives. They often exchanged visits and letters and the older residents say that they were once engaged to be married, tho this is denied by relatives.

Miss Walker has been a close student of current events, even those of a political nature.
