—Rochester mourns the death of her boss, George W. Aldridge. He was the big noise in politics in Monroe County being Republican committee leader and collector of the Port of New York. He was playing golf and died suddenly of heart trouble.

—Systematic thieving from the P. —The residents of Water Street have been disturbed lately by strange autos parking for the night. The name was presented by Richard Dudley of Cuba, who says, "Shenawana," meaning "brave man," was the name given Moses Van Campen by the Indian warriors after he successfully ran the gauntlet a few miles from the site chosen for the camp. Dudley will receive the reward offered for the best name.

—Charles Rouse and Nellie Krier, who gave their residence as Olean, N. Y., were taken in by the Wellsville police Wednesday afternoon, on a charge of attempted bootlegging. The information was furnished by Sheriff Weir of Belmont, who telephoned the Wellsville police to be on the lookout for the pair, stating that they had attempted to sell it in Belmont. Mayor Sweeney and Officer Shine located the car, which was a Buick roadster, bearing the license No. 137-337, parked on State Street. Investigation showed that the car contained a large suitcase in which was found a number of quart bottles of liquor. A gallon jug containing booze was also found. The parties were taken before Justice Leonard, where they were charged with having liquor in their possession. After a hearing, they were held for the grand jury and, being unable to furnish bail, they were taken to the Belmont jail by Sheriff Weir.
