TAKES CLEAN MILK FOR PRIME CHEESE

High Quality Product Depends of Care From Cow to Factory and Back Again

Don't expect the cheese factory Don't expect the cheese factory to take any old milk, so long as it isn't thick or lobbered, is the advice of the dairy specialists at the State Agricultural College at Ithaca. Recent investigations show that cheese of prime quality can only be made from milk that is clean flavored and sweet, which means that milk must be kepticlean and cool until it is delivered at the cheese factory.

Suggestions for handling milk in.

Suggestions for handling milk in-clude first of all neatness and clean-lines of the dairyman and his men. The college finds that cans are not as likely to be kept scrupulously clean if whey is returned in them, and sug-gests that emptying, washing and scalding them as soon as they come back well repays the extra time it takes.

July 1st Every dog must wear a tag of the current dog license year. A dog with-out such a tag is not protected by law, and no action can be maintained

law, and no action can be maintained for his injury or destruction.

An unlicensed dog may be seized and killed, and the fact that a dog is without a tag is presumptive evidence that the dog is unlicensed.

Dog licenses must. be obtained from the Clerk of the city or town where the dog is harbored or kept.

License Fees are as Followa;
Male dog \$2.25
Female dog 5.25
Spayed female dog 2.25
These amounts include clerk's fees

These amounts include clerk's fees No license can be issued for less than the full license fee.

The owner of a dog who fails or refuses to obtain a license for the dog as required by law incurs a penalty of \$10.00 and costs.

The assessors of towns and the police departments of cities are required to prepare in June of each year a list of dog owners. The omnission of the name of an owner from the assessors or police list will not excuse the owner from obtaining a license.
