TAKES CLEAN MILK FOR PRIME CHEESE

High Quality Product Depends on Care From Cow to Factory and Back Again

Don't expect the cheese factory to take any old milk, so long as it isn't thick or lobbied, is the advice of the dairy specialists at the State Agricultural College at Ithaca.

Suggestions for handling milk include first of all neatness and cleanliness of the dairyman and his men.

MORE HEAT FROM DOMESTIC GAS BURNERS

Washington, June. — Scientists of the United States Bureau of Standards have been working for eighteen months with apparatus for testing the efficiency of gas burners in an effort to produce greater utilization of heat value.

Specific tests have proved that some appliances in common use utilize only 10 to 30 per cent. of the heat value of the gas.

By a readjustment of the burners or displacement of inefficient appliances it has been found possible to utilize 30 to 50 per cent. of the heat value.

This improvement, when worked out, will be comparable to that made in electric lighting by the perfection of the tungsten lamp, which gives four times as much light as the old style carbon filament lamp for the use of a given quantity of electricity.

SIRE WITH PEDIGREE MAKES PROFITS JUMP

Purebred sires owned by more than 500 farmers in this country led to an average increase in financial returns from live stock operations of 48 per cent., according to the report of an investigation made late last year by the Federal Department of Agriculture.

Purebreds are found to excel other stock in four principal ways, the college says: Superiority and uniformity in conformation and type, greater sale value, greater and more economical production, and earlier maturity.

DOGS

All Dog Licenses Expire on June 30. The 1922 License Fee is Due July 1st

Every dog must wear a tag of the current dog license year. A dog without such a tag is not protected by law, and no action can be maintained for his injury or destruction.

An unlicensed dog may be seized and killed, and the fact that a dog is without a tag is presumptive evidence that the dog is unlicensed.

Dog licenses must be obtained from the Clerk of the city or town where the dog is harbored or kept.

License Fees are as Follows: Male dog \$2.25, Female dog 5.25, Spayed female dog 2.25

The owner of a dog who fails or refuses to obtain a license for the dog as required by law incurs a penalty of \$10.00 and costs.

The assessors of towns and the police departments of cities are required to prepare in June of each year a list of dog owners.
