Deposition of Metals. It is reported that there has been devised abroad a new process for spraying metals onto surfaces of any kind. The metal to be sprayed forms one of the electrodes of an arc, and a blast of gas implines on this elec-

trode, directed, however, in such a manner as not to play on the arc and artinguish it.

The gas used for the blast is of a non-oxidizing nature, and its effect is to earry away fine particles of metal, which can thus be deposited on any kind of surface, forming a very thin
