**JIM DEAN NOT AT FAULT**

Coroner Exonerates Andover Man From Blame in Auto Accident

A Hornell dispatch says that Coroner Stewart, at the inquest on the death of Jerry Lundrigan, killed by an automobile Wednesday night, exonerated the driver, James Dean, of Andover, and announced the conclusion that the accident was purely accidental.

Dean is a farmer who lives a little ways out of Andover, and was driving into Hornell about 11 o'clock Wednesday night. With him was John H. O'Connor, of Wellsville, who conducts the restaurant at 103 South Main Street; Mortimer Driscoll, a blacksmith, of Andover; and Harry Monyhan, who is the Erie section boss working out of Andover, but whose mother lives on Dyke Street, Wellsville.

Stories differ as to how the accident occurred, but the two pedestrians were walking out of Hornell and were just off the brick pavement going toward Almond, when the Dean car came long Callahan got off the road, but Lundrigan, who was behind him, evidently stepped into the road in time to be hit by the car. The injured man was picked up and taken to St. James Hospital, while O'Connor went to the police station and reported the accident, and it was this that gave circulation to the report that the car belonged to O'Connor.

**CONCRETE ROAD FOR GREENWOOD**

Geo. Dennison of Hornell Gets Job for \$89,837.40

The contract for the construction of the 2.78 miles of concrete road to complete the gap between Canisteo and Greenwood, was let at Albany Wednesday. There were several bids and Lee Dennison of Hornell, son of George Dennison, formerly of Rexville, was awarded the contract at \$89,837.40, only \$4.10 under the bid of the next lowest firm, the Greenfield Construction Co. of Hornell.

The contract calls for construction this year. The work on the abutments of the Bassett bridge which will have one 110 foot span has been started by Supt. A. O. Cornell of Canisteo and the iron work is being fabricated by the American Bridge Co. of Elmira. It is to be 20 feet wide and will be set slanting to the creek to eliminate the dangerous curve of the old bridge.

There are no gradients on this section, it being nearly level. This will leave only the mile of rough road at Moore's, built several years ago by the town of Canisteo which is in dire need of a new top.

**PLEASED THE "MONEY BAGS"**

European Capitalists Listened With Pleasure to Accounts of Rockefeller's Stupendous Wealth.

During my stay in London I accepted an invitation to have luncheon with Lord Rothschild at his office, John Hays Hammond writes in Scribner's. It had been my custom, extending over a period of many years, to drop in informally and have luncheon with the Rothschilds once or twice during each of my frequent visits to London. On these occasions always the most interesting topic of conversation was my estimate of the wealth of Rockefeller and other rich Americans. Lord Rothschild invariably introduced the subject and forewarned, I was ready to give him the desired thrill. He would usually start with some "piker" capitalist, whose wealth did not amount to more than the paltry sum of \$100,000,000, and then worked up by queries until he reached the American Croesus, John D. Rockefeller. It would be an unpatriotic American who would belittle the wealth of a competitor at a time like this, and after having modestly admitted, in reply to Lord Rothschild's question, that Rockefeller was certainly worth \$500,000,000, assuming an air of ultra-conservatism, I would allow him to extort what was to him a delectable fact that Rockefeller was worth at least \$750,000,000; and when the money bags around the table stared at me with an expression of pleased surprise, but not of doubt, I would in subdued tone convey to them the fact that in informed financial circles of America the Rockefeller's wealth was estimated at over \$1,000,000,000! The internationalism of the Rothschild family, and the utter lack of envy, is evidenced in the unmistakable pleasure which characterized the reception of this titbit of high finance.

**Deposition of Metals.**

It is reported that there has been devised a new process for spraying metals onto surfaces of any kind. The metal to be sprayed forms one of the electrodes of an arc, and a blast of gas impinges on this electrode, directed, however, in such a manner as not to play on the arc and extinguish it.

The gas used for the blast is of a non-oxidizing nature, and its effect is to carry away fine particles of metal, which can thus be deposited on any kind of surface, forming a very thin skin.

When potyphase currents are used, the electrodes may either be convergent or so placed as to cross the streams of gas.

In one form of the apparatus the arc is started by means of the instantaneous discharge from an auxiliary high-tension circuit—Exchange.
