ALFRED UNIVERSITY GIVES THREE HONORARY DEGREES Rev. Charles C. MacLean, formerly of Hornell, and now of Batavia, Frank L. Bartlett of Olean and Hon. G. F. Darrow, of Philadelphia, were given honorary degrees at the 86th Commencement of Alfred University Wednesday morning, Jun 14th. President Davis conferred the degree of D. D. on Rev. MacLean and the degree of LL. D. on Mr. Bartlett and Congressman Darrow.

MRS. ROXANA BURROWS

Many were the sorrowing hearts in Andover when word came Friday morning of the death of Mrs. Roxana Burrows, at St. James Mercy Hospital, Hornell.

While Mrs. Burrows had been ill for several months, it was that that she was on the road to recovery and her sudden passing was a shock to Andover people.

Roxana Bradley Burrows was the daughter of the late Daniel S. and Emily Bradley, and was born in the Town of Unadilla, N. Y., May 23, 1853. She came with her parents to Andover when a small child and has made this her home since. She was married in 1871 to Augustus M. Burrows, who died in 1906. To them were born two sons, Arthur Burrows, who died in 1912, and Frank W. Burrows, of New York City.

Mrs. Burrows was a woman of strong convictions and earnest purpose, and had the power and force of character to become a strong leader in every cause she championed. She was most widely known as an ardent worker for woman suffrage, having served two years as corresponding secretary of the New York State Women Suffrage Association, and her ability as an organizer was widely known.

Mrs. Burrows was a zealous member of the Baptist Church of this village and her efforts in behalf of her church and its auxiliaries untiring. She had been for years a member of the local W. C. T. U. and responded to all philanthropic appeals with characteristic generosity, giving liberally of her sympathy and means to those in affliction. Mrs. Burrows was at the time of her death, a member of the executive committee of the Republican County General Committee and active in its policies.

Besides her son, Frank W. Burrows of New York City, Mrs. Burrows is survived by an only sister, Mrs. W. W. Miller, of Wellsboro, Pa., and two grandchildren, Virginia Burrows, of Albany, and John Burrows of New York City.

Funeral services, conducted at her late home in this village, Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock, were largely attended, her pastor, Rev. A. D. Shepard, officiating, assisted by Rev. W. H. Smith, of the Methodist Church. The interment was in the family plot in Valley Brook Cemetery.

OTHER TOWNS GET THEIR DRENCHING

Wednesday's Storm Washed Erie and W. N. Y. & P. Tracks, Delaying Traffic. Hornell Damaged

According to the reports from the surrounding vicinity, some authentic and some not, the heavy rains Wednesday did considerable damage. Parts of Hornell were under several feet of water, the subway was full and the streets covered up so far as to run into the cellar at the Sherwood Hotel. Canisteo received its share, the water being on a level with the floor in some of the business places.

The Erie tracks near Almond were washed out, delaying all local trains for several hours. The thru trains were sent over the Cuba cutoff.

Whitesville and Genesee were badly flooded, bridges were washed out, a small hamlet near Genesee, known as Perryville, is said to have been nearly annihilated. The water put the "Nip" railroad out of commission again, the extent of the damage to its tracks has not yet been learned.

Andover missed this storm, for which we are exceedingly thankful.
