Origin of Plavora.

Among the most remarkable glimpses into hidden corners of nature that scientific advance has afforded are the frequent discoveries of micro-organisms in unexpected places, where they produce phenomens haretofore supposed to rise from other causes. For instance, a scientist, in Upsala, Sweden, ascertained that in preparations of meet and fish containing, for purpose of preservation, salt to the amount of 15 per cent, micro-organisms grow luxuriantly, and he concludes that the flavors and odors that are peculiar to various salt conserves are due to the micro-organisms with which they are crowded.—Exchange.
