**CROP CULTIVATION DELAYED BY RAINS**

Sunshine and drying weather are badly needed for farm work, according to the summary of weather and crop conditions for the week ending July 4th, issued by the Ithaca office of the Weather Bureau. Moderately warm weather prevailed except on the last two days, which were cool. Sunshine continued inadequate and rainfall was again heavy, further seriously delaying cultivation and haying; most crops, however, except corn, made good growth. Lowland crops continue to suffer injury from excessive moisture, some sections being still under water. Corn in general is only fair and badly in need of cultivation. Potatoes generally are very good, although there are some reports that those late planted are rotting. Oats are mostly in good condition. Hay is very good, but little has been cut because of the unfavorable weather conditions. Pastures are excellent. The planting of buckwheat is greatly delayed. Cherries are mostly picked. Apples continue to drop, and considerable scab is reported. Berries are ripening and of good quality.

**VOL. XXXVII. BILLIARD ROOM LICENSE**

Assemblyman D. wishes the New Following Interests of the New

Andover News, Andover, N. Y.

Dear Sir: I have received so many from all over the county provisions of the new Licensing Bill, which goes into effect on September 1st, that I desire to make a brief paper as to the requirements of the Bill as follows:

Billiard rooms, or public places, where pool tables are played, must take out a license for which shall be \$100.00. This does not include rooms which are not run by a person who has been convicted nor to any person who is or who has not filled his term of imprisonment to become a citizen.

Application should be made to the County Clerk, New York State Tax Office, Albany, N. Y., which upon application blank \$100.00 is required. This law will be in effect on September 1st and the billiard room license certificates will be issued on that date. Gambling of all sorts by children under eighteen is not allowed to enter a billiard room unless by parent, or legally appointed.

Billiard rooms cannot be operated between midnight and seven o'clock morning.

Intoxicating liquors cannot be sold, bartered or a billiard room.

Habit-forming drugs cannot be sold in any billiard room.

Soft drinks, lunches, prohibited nor is any of business such as barber, shoe-shining parlor.

Instructions to a clear room in which the tables are prohibited.

Private rooms or parlor billiard room are prohibited. The word "pool-room" is defined and in its place "billiards" and "pocket-balls" to be used.
