Wooleask in British House of Loads King Edward III.

In a place of honor in the British house of lords is a large red such right in front of the throne. It about five feet long and two feet square at the ends, and is known as the wookset of historic seaf of the lord woodself of historic seat of the lord chancellor of the realm. This is one of the sacred British institutions. Its installation as a seat of honor for the head of the indictory department of the government dates back to the time of Edward III, when wool was the chief stuple of England.

It was not, however, until the time of Henry VIII that the woolsack was dignified and thoroughly established as an institution by the following en ment: "The lord chancellor, lord trensurer and all other officers who shall be under the degree of a baron of a parliament shall sit and be placed at the uppermost part of the sacks in the midst of the parliament chamber, either there to sit upon one form or upon the uppermost sack."
