CHARLES K. COMSTOCK

Charles K. Comstock died at his home in Hornell Sunday morning, July 16th, of heart disease, aged 68 years. Mr. Comstock was born in Andover, but the greater part of his life was passed in Hartsville, removing from that place to Hornell about seven years ago.

He is survived by his wife, a son, Supervisor D. J. Comstock of Hartsville, and a daughter, Miss Clara Comstock, secretary of the Children's Aid Society; one brother, Dr. F. J. Comstock, of Wellsville, and three sisters, Mrs. Nan Lever, of Andover; Mrs. C. P. Sutton and Mrs. Etta Phillips, of Hornell. Mr. Comstock was the third in a family of four boys who died at the age of 88 years. Funeral services were held Wednesday, and interment made in Rural Cemetery, Hornell.
